### HOUSING FACILITIES, GENERAL.

§3.75 Housing facilities, general.

(c) Surfaces

(2) Maintenance and replacement of surfaces. All surfaces must be maintained on a regular basis. Surfaces of housing facilities -- including houses, dens, and other furniture-type fixtures and objects within the facility -- that cannot be readily cleaned and sanitized, must be replaced when worn or soiled.

The paint on the floor of Trailer Y is chipped, with exposed metal underneath and rust in the cracks and seams. Surfaces with chipped paint, cracks, and rust are difficult to clean thoroughly and therefore pose a potential risk to animal health. Surfaces of housing facilities must be maintained in good condition so that they can be adequately cleaned.

### CLEANING, SANITIZATION, HOUSEKEEPING, AND PEST CONTROL.

§3.84 Cleaning, sanitization, housekeeping, and pest control.

(c) Housekeeping for premises. Premises where housing facilities are located, including buildings and surrounding grounds, must be kept clean and in good repair in order to protect the nonhuman primates from injury, to facilitate the husbandry practices required in this subpart, and to reduce or eliminate breeding and living areas for rodents, pests, and vermin. Premises must be kept free of accumulations of trash, junk, waste, and discarded matter. Weeds, grass, and bushes must be controlled so as to facilitate cleaning of the premises and pest control.

The surface of the floor in the food preparation kitchen is cracked and peeling up. Premises where housing facilities are located, including food preparation areas, must be kept clean and in good repair. A peeling and cracked floor

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surface is difficult to clean thoroughly, and may accumulate debris that could adversely affect animal health. Damaged flooring should be repaired or replaced so that the surface is intact and therefore possible to keep clean.

### **CLEANING, SANITIZATION, HOUSEKEEPING, AND PEST CONTROL.**

§3.84 Cleaning, sanitization, housekeeping, and pest control.

(a) Cleaning of primary enclosures. Excreta and food waste must be removed from inside each indoor primary enclosure daily and from underneath them as often as necessary to prevent an excessive accumulation of feces and food waste, to prevent the nonhuman primates from becoming soiled, and to reduce disease hazards, insects, pests, and odors. Dirt floors, floors with absorbent bedding, and planted areas in primary enclosures must be spot-cleaned with sufficient frequency to ensure all animals the freedom to avoid contact with excreta, or as often as necessary to reduce disease hazards, insects, pests, and odors. When steam or water is used to clean the primary enclosure, whether by hosing, flushing, or other methods, nonhuman primates must be removed, unless the enclosure is large enough to ensure the animals will not be harmed, wetted, or distressed in the process. Perches, bars, and shelves must be kept clean and replaced when worn. If the species of the nonhuman primates housed in the primary enclosure engages in scent marking, hard surfaces in the primary enclosure must be spot-cleaned daily.

The walls inside trailers Y and Z had a residue of particulate matter which was visible and could be felt when touching the wall surface. Hard surfaces which nonhuman primates come in contact must be kept clean to ensure the health of the animals. A protocol should be put in place to ensure that all surfaces in animal areas are cleaned thoroughly.

#### ATTENDING VETERINARIAN AND ADEQUATE VETERINARY CARE (DEALERS AND EXHIBITORS).

(a)Each exhibitor shall have an attending veterinarian who shall provide adequate veterinary care to its animals in compliance with this section. (1) Each exhibitor shall employ an attending veterinarian under formal arrangements. In the case of a part-time attending veterinarian or consultant arrangements, the formal arrangements shall include a written program of veterinary care and regularly scheduled visits to the premises of the exhibitor.

There is no written program of veterinary care as required by this section of the regulation. A written program of veterinary care ensures that proper attention to the animal's health is provided in a judicious manner. Each exhibitor shall employ an attending veterinarian under formal arrangements, which shall provide adequate veterinary care to its animals. In the case of a part-time attending veterinarian, the formal arrangements shall include a written program of veterinary care to the premises of the exhibitor.

#### CLEANING, SANITIZATION, HOUSEKEEPING, AND PEST CONTROL.

(c)Housekeeping for premises. Premises where housing facilities are located, including buildings and surrounding grounds, must be kept clean and in good repair in order to protect the nonhuman primates from injury, to facilitate the husbandry practices required in this subpart, and to reduce or eliminate breeding and living areas for rodents, pests, and vermin. Premises must be kept free of accumulations of trash, junk, waste, and discarded matter. Weeds, grass, and bushes must be controlled so as to facilitate cleaning of the premises and pest control.

There were building materials in a pile located behind the office space. There were also water hoses, ropes, plastic buckets, plastic containers and lids and various enrichment toys along with a vehicle that appeared to be abandoned adjacent to the animal enclosure. Excess materials such as those described above create harborage areas for rodents. Premises, including buildings and surrounding grounds, must be kept clean in order to facilitate husbandry practices and reduce or eliminate breeding and living areas for rodents, pests, and vermin. A system is needed to ensure the premises are maintained clean.
