ATTENDING VETERINARIAN AND ADEQUATE VETERINARY CARE.

*** Section 2.33 Attending veterinarian and adequate veterinary care. (b) Each research facility shall establish and maintain programs of adequate veterinary care that include: (2) The use of appropriate methods to prevent, control, diagnose, and treat diseases and injuries.***

During the inspection, the following expired medical materials were found commingled among non-expired medical materials: four bottles of isoflurane (250 mls) which expired in June 2008; one bottle of septisol sterile solution (473 mls) which expired in March 2008; and four boxes of vacutainer (100 each) tubes, which expired in May 2008. The use of expired medical materials on regulated animals is not considered to be an acceptable veterinary practice and does not constitute adequate veterinary care as required by the above regulation of the Animal Welfare Act. Medical materials often have an expiration date, beyond which the manufacturer does not guarantee the stability of the item. The use of expired medical materials is undesirable, as these materials may lose their potency and may degrade to toxic by products and give unpredictable outcome if used on the animals. A system is needed to ensure that all expired medical materials be identified, labeled and stored in an area separate from the non-expired medical materials or properly disposed of on a regular basis. All the expired items were corrected during the inspection.
