2.31(d)(ix) Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee (IACUC)

All survival surgery will be performed using aseptic procedures, including surgical gloves, masks, sterile instruments, and aseptic techniques.

-- The hydraulic surgery table is rusted completely through in one area, with loose rust chips that could be picked off and rust in others areas of the table that are not completely through. The rust and disrepair do not allow for adequate cleaning and sanitation for routine infection prevention when major surgical procedures are performed. The facility shall establish and maintain a maintenance program that includes procedures for maintaining the surgery table in good repair so that it is readily cleanable and sanitizable to facilitate an environment that will minimize the risk of infections when major operative procedures are performed.

To be Corrected By:

The facility should repair or replace the rusted hydraulic surgery table by 7-7-09.

The facility should develop and practice interim procedures that minimize the risk of infection from the deteriorated surgical table before any major surgical procedures are performed.

(c) Storage. Supplies of food and bedding shall be stored in facilities which adequately protect such supplies against deterioration, molding, or contamination by vermin.

--The facility is not storing grain in a manner that protects it from contamination by vermin. An open cart is used to store grain which is not expected to be used up for at least 2 days. This leaves the grain vulnerable to contamination by vermin and the barn cats which roam freely on the premises. Contamination of the food by the excreta of vermin such as rodents, or cats, can spread disease. The facility shall provide a method of food storage that can be

(c) Housekeeping. Premises (buildings and grounds) shall be kept clean and in good repair in order to protect the animals from injury and to facilitate the prescribed husbandry practices set forth in this subpart. Accumulations of trash shall be placed in designated areas and cleared as necessary to protect the health of the animals.

--The facility is not keeping the pastures clean of extraneous farm equipment. In the pasture containing 3 cattle and 21 sheep, a piece of farm equipment is being stored near a fence. The animals could potentially be injured by running into the equipment or catching a leg in it. The facility shall keep the pastures and animal enclosures clean and in good repair to protect the animals from injury.

--The euthanasia method used on sheep #4117 was not described in the protocol, 2006-50. The IACUC must be able to review all euthanasia methods to assure the animals are euthanized in a humane manner. All protocols must describe the method of euthanasia and the method must be one approved by the AVMA.

Excreta shall be removed from primary enclosures as often as necessary to prevent contamination of the animals and to minimize disease hazards and to reduce odors.

--There is a buildup of fecal material in the covered pen currently housing one steer. A large portion of the steer's body is covered with a buildup of brownish material. There is also some green material on the side of the steer near the rumen cannula that may be from the cannula leaking. There is no area of the pen where the animal can lay down, without becoming contaminated with fecal material, as the floor is composed of ground up fecal material. The facility representative on site states that the pen has not been cleaned out since the Fall of 2006.

Inadequate sanitation can lead to fly problems and cause discomfort to the animal. Excreta buildup may also lead to increased parasite loads in the animal. Correct by removing excreta often enough to prevent contamination of the animal and to minimize disease hazards and to reduce odors.

MISCELLANEOUS.

(a) Information as to business: furnishing of same by research facilities. Each research facility shall furnish to any APHIS official any information concerning the business of the research facility which the APHIS official may request in connection with the enforcement of the provisions of the Act, the regulations, and the standards in this subchapter. The information shall be furnished within a reasonable time and as may be specified in the request for information.

--During a telephone conversations with the attending veterinarian on 3-21-07 and 3-22-07, the inspector requested a complete copy of protocol 2006-50, a copy of the complete records for the last 5 animals on this protocol that had been necropsied, and a copy of the protocol covering a steer with a rumen cannula. Requested documents were to be furnished by 3-23-07. As of 3-30-07, none of these requested documents have been received by Animal Care. Review of these records are needed to assure compliance with the AWA, Regulations and Standards.
