INSTITUTIONAL ANIMAL CARE AND USE COMMITTEE (IACUC).

Item IACUC 2.31 d 1 ii

The IACUC shall insure the principal investigator consider alternatives to painful or distressful procedures and considered alternatives to the painful procedures and has provided a written narrative of the methods used to determine none where available.

For protocol 2006-202 and 2008-253 both protocols involve the use of craniotomies in primates. There is no evidence the investigator considered alternatives to these procedures.

For protocol 2008-253 the investigator uses a water restriction procedure but there is no evidence the investigator considered alternatives.

The IACUC needs to insure the investigators consider alternatives to all painful/distress procedures and provide the sources consulted.

PRIMARY ENCLOSURES.

Item Primary Enclosures 3.80 b 2 iv

When more than one nonhuman primate is housed in a primary enclosure the minimum space requirement for the enclosure is the sum of the minimum floor area space requirement for each individual primate.

At the time of inspection facility has 2 gang cages for squirrel monkeys each cage measures 3 ft by 8ft for a total of 24 sq ft

One cage has 11 squirrel monkeys and the other has 12. Squirrel monkeys are in group 2 primates requiring a floor area of 3 sq ft each therefore the maximum that can be housed in the cage are 8 squirrel monkeys.

Facility needs to adjust the number of monkeys in the cages to meet requirements.

CLEANING, SANITIZATION, HOUSEKEEPING, AND PEST CONTROL.

Item Sanitization 3.84 b

Indoor primary enclosures must be sanitized at least once every 2 weeks and as often as necessary to prevent an excessive accumulation of dirt, debris or excreta.

Capuchin gang cage rm 18 has plastic perches along the sides; there is an accumulation of debris, dirt and fecal material on the underside of the perches.

Facility needs to insure proper cleaning and sanitizing of all surfaces.

Item Housekeeping 3.84.c

Premises shall be kept clean and in good repair to facilitate good husbandry practices.

Investigator rm 23 has areas of ceiling that are peeling and air vents that are rusty and need to be repaired.

Facility needs to repair surfaces.
