2.33 (b) (1) REPEAT

ATTENDING VETERINARIAN AND ADEQUATE VETERINARY CARE.

(b) Each research facility shall establish and maintain programs of adequate veterinary care that include:

(1) The availability of appropriate facilities, personnel, equipment, and services to comply with the provisions of this subchapter;

The Program of Veterinary Care stated under Sanitation that "the animal room and storage spaces must be kept free of dirt, debris and sources of contamination..." There was a 1 liter square shaped bottle under the sink with a bright yellow substance that smelled like ammonia in the animal room with no label indicating the contents. This is a source of potential contamination.

It is important to the health and well-being of the guinea pigs to live in facilities that fully comply with the Program of Veterinary Care. The unidentified bottle under the sink in the animal room represented a potential source of contamination.

The bottle was labeled during the inspection process.

The inspection and exit interview occurred with a microbiology technician from the lab.
