HSUS STATE DIRECTORS ALSO WORKED AS PART OF COALITIONS TO SUCCESSFULLY

DEFEAT SO-CALLED "AG-GAG" LEGISLATION IN 11 STATES WHERE FACTORY

FARMING INTERESTS ENGINEERED THEIR INTRODUCTION: ARKANSAS, CALIFORNIA,

INDIANA, NEBRASKA, NEW HAMPSHIRE, NEW MEXICO, NORTH CAROLINA,

PENNSYLVANIA, TENNESSEE, WYOMING AND VERMONT. THESE BILLS WERE WRITTEN

AND ADVANCED TO BLOCK UNDERCOVER INVESTIGATIONS BY THE HSUS AND OTHER

ANIMAL PROTECTION GROUPS, MAINLY AT FACTORY FARMS, DESIGNED TO EXPOSE

ILLEGAL AND UNETHICAL ACTIVITY AT SUCH FACILITIES.

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IN 2013, THE HSUS CONTINUED ITS HUMANE STATE RANKINGS, AN ACCOUNT OF ANIMAL-FRIENDLY REGULATIONS AND LAWS IN ALL FIFTY STATES.

ANIMAL PROTECTION LITIGATION

THE HSUS'S ANIMAL PROTECTION LITIGATION (APL) SECTION CARRIES OUT PRECEDENT-SETTING LEGAL WORK ON BEHALF OF ANIMALS IN STATE AND FEDERAL COURTS AROUND THE COUNTRY, RESEARCHING, PREPARING, AND PROSECUTING ANIMAL PROTECTION LAWSUITS, MAINLY IN THE AREAS COVERED BY ITS FIVE CORE LITIGATION GROUPS: FARM ANIMALS, COMPANION ANIMALS AND ANIMAL CRUELTY, WILDLIFE, LEGISLATION, AND INTERNATIONAL LAW. SINCE 2005, APL HAS FILED MORE THAN 130 LEGAL ACTIONS; SECURED 110 FAVORABLE RULINGS FOR ANIMALS IN STATE AND FEDERAL COURTS; AND WON MILLIONS OF DOLLARS IN JUDGMENTS, SETTLEMENTS, AND ATTORNEYS' FEES FROM A RANGE OF PARTIES.

IN 2013, APL GRAPPLED WITH NEARLY A DOZEN NEW LAWSUITS SEEKING TO OVERTURN LEGISLATIVE VICTORIES FOR ANIMALS. IN CALIFORNIA, APL FACED DOWN SIX DIFFERENT LAWSUITS AND WON RULINGS UPHOLDING THE STATE'S HISTORIC BANS ON CRUEL TRAPPING METHODS, FORCE-FEEDING OF DUCKS FOR FOIE GRAS, SHARK FINNING, AND INTENSIVE CONFINEMENT OF FARM ANIMALS.

APL ALSO TOOK LEGAL ACTION ON BEHALF OF CONSUMERS DUPED INTO BUYING FACTORY-FARMED CHICKEN MISLABELED AS "HUMANELY RAISED," AND LITIGATED ON BEHALF OF NEIGHBORS OF FACTORY FARMS IN RURAL COMMUNITIES OF MINNESOTA AND IOWA. APL SUCCESSFULLY PETITIONED THE USDA TO END THE SLAUGHTER OF VEAL CALVES TOO SICK OR INJURED TO WALK, AND WORKED WITH PRO BONO LAWYERS AND FEDERAL PROSECUTORS TO SECURE THE LARGEST PENALTY

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FOR ANIMAL ABUSE EVER: A \$500 MILLION SYMBOLIC JUDGMENT AGAINST THE NOW
DEFUNCT HALLMARK MEAT PACKING COMPANY, WHERE HSUS INVESTIGATORS EXPOSED
SHOCKING CRUELTY TO DOWNER COWS IN 2008. WHILE THE JUDGMENT CANNOT BE
RECOVERED, IT WILL DETER FUTURE CRUELTY AND FRAUD AT THE NATION'S
SLAUGHTER PLANTS.

IN AUGUST, APL WON A TEMPORARY INJUNCTION AGAINST HORSE SLAUGHTER,
SEEKING TO BUY TIME FOR CONGRESS TO PASS PROPOSED LEGISLATION TO DEFUND
HORSE SLAUGHTER. THIS WAS PART OF A TWO-YEAR EFFORT TO FORESTALL THE
RESUMPTION OF HORSE SLAUGHTER AFTER CONGRESS RESTORED FUNDING FOR
DOMESTIC HORSE SLAUGHTER INSPECTIONS IN THE FALL OF 2011. APL ALSO
FILED TWO LEGAL PETITIONS WITH USDA AND FDA, AND THEN USDA TO FEDERAL
COURT.

IN JUNE, THE U.S. FISH AND WILDLIFE SERVICE GRANTED A LEGAL PETITION
FILED BY HSUS LAWYERS SEEKING TO LIST ALL CHIMPANZEES, WHETHER WILD OR
CAPTIVE, AS ENDANGERED. ONCE FINALIZED IN 2015, THE REGULATION WILL
SIGNIFICANTLY CURTAIL THE USE OF CAPTIVE CHIMPANZEES IN INVASIVE
RESEARCH AND THE PET AND ENTERTAINMENT TRADE.

APL LAWYERS SCORED TWO MAJOR VICTORIES FOR SOME OF THE WORLD'S MOST
ENDANGERED WHALES. IN AUGUST, THE NATIONAL MARINE FISHERIES SERVICE
SETTLED THE HSUS'S LAWSUIT OVER ENTANGLEMENT OF ENDANGERED WHALES IN
FISHING GEAR, AGREEING TO ISSUE NEW RULES TO PREVENT ENTANGLEMENTS, AND
TO CONSIDER CLOSING AREAS TO FISHING WHEN WHALES ARE PRESENT. IN
DECEMBER, THE NMFS ISSUED A FINAL RULE REAUTHORIZING SHIP SPEED LIMITS
IN THE HABITAT OF ENDANGERED WHALES IN RESPONSE TO A LEGAL PETITION
FILED BY THE HSUS IN JUNE 2012. SOME OF THE BUSIEST SHIPPING AREAS

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COINCIDE WITH FEEDING, BREEDING, AND NURSING GROUNDS, AND MORTALITY

FROM SHIP STRIKES IS ONE OF THE TWO PRIMARY THREATS TO THESE SPECIES.

IN JULY, A FEDERAL COURT UPHELD NEW FEDERAL REGULATIONS TO PREVENT THE

PRACTICE OF "SORING," IN WHICH TRAINERS ABUSE HORSES TO FORCE THEM TO

PERFORM AN UNNATURAL HIGH-STEPPING GAIT FOR COMPETITIONS. THE U.S.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE REGULATIONS WERE ADOPTED FOLLOWING A 2010

LEGAL PETITION FILED BY HSUS ATTORNEYS.

APL ALSO SQUARED OFF WITH TROPHY HUNTING GROUPS SEEKING TO SHOOT SOME

OF THE WORLD'S MOST ENDANGERED ANIMALS. A FEDERAL COURT STRUCK A BLOW

IN AUGUST BY THROWING OUT A CHALLENGE TO A FEDERAL RULE LISTING THE

SCIMITAR-HORNED ORYX, THE ADDAX, AND THE DAMA GAZELLE AS ENDANGERED.

THE COURT OF APPEALS TURNED AWAY THE SAFARI CLUB'S BID TO IMPORT TROPHY

HEADS OF ENDANGERED POLAR BEARS SHOT IN CANADA.

IN A RARE DAY OF RECKONING FOR AN UNSCRUPULOUS PUPPY MILL DOG DEALER,

THE OWNERS OF A SOUTH FLORIDA PUPPY BUSINESS WERE SET TO STAND TRIAL IN

DECEMBER FOR REPEATEDLY SELLING SICK OR DYING PUPPY MILL DOGS TO

UNSUSPECTING CONSUMERS. A LAST-MINUTE SETTLEMENT AVOIDED TRIAL, AND

REQUIRED THE DEFENDANTS TO STOP SOURCING DOGS FROM PUPPY MILLS, FOLLOW

STRICT NEW RECORDKEEPING REQUIREMENTS, AND SET UP A SIX FIGURE

SETTLEMENT FUND TO COMPENSATE THEIR VICTIMS.

WHEN THE RALEIGH TRANSIT AUTHORITY IN NORTH CAROLINA REFUSED TO RUN AN

HSUS BUS ADVERTISEMENT DEPICTING THE LIFE OF PIGS IN GESTATION CRATES

BECAUSE IT WAS "TOO NEGATIVE," APL FILED SUIT UNDER THE FIRST

AMENDMENT. SHORTLY THEREAFTER, THE CITY SETTLED THE CASE, AGREEING TO

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RUN THE BUS AD, AND FEATURING IT ON TWO CITY BUSES FOR SIX MONTHS.

CAMPAIGNS

THE HSUS PURSUES A NUMBER OF HIGH-PRIORITY ISSUES THROUGH A CAMPAIGNS SECTION THAT FOCUSES EXTRA ATTENTION AND RESOURCES ON DYNAMIC PROGRESS.

IN 2013, THE CAMPAIGNS SECTION WORKED ON FARM ANIMAL PROTECTION, RURAL OUTREACH, AND PUPPY MILLS.

FARM ANIMAL PROTECTION

THE FARM ANIMAL PROTECTION CAMPAIGN WORKS WITH CONSUMERS, CORPORATIONS, AND POLICY MAKERS TO SPUR REFORM IN THE TREATMENT OF ANIMALS RAISED FOR FOOD. THE HSUS SUPPORTS HUMANE FARMERS AND HUMANE, SUSTAINABLE FARMING PRACTICES, AND ENCOURAGES THE PUBLIC TO FOLLOW THE 3RS, I.E. REDUCTION OF CONSUMPTION OF ANIMAL PRODUCTS; REFINEMENT, BY WORKING TO ACHIEVE REFORMS IN THE WAYS IN WHICH ANIMALS ARE RAISED AND TREATED IN THE AGRIBUSINESS SECTOR, AND BY ENCOURAGING CONSUMERS TO CHOOSE PRODUCTS NOT DERIVED FROM FACTORY FARMING AND REPLACEMENT, THE INCORPORATION OF PLANT FOODS INTO THE DIET.

EXPLANATION: 2013 ACCOMPLISHMENTS INCLUDED SUCCESS IN PERSUADING EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS, RESTAURANT CHAINS, AND CORPORATIONS TO IMPROVE ANIMAL WELFARE PURCHASING POLICIES IN RELATION TO CRATE-FREE PORK, CAGE-FREE EGGS AND OTHER ANIMAL PRODUCTS. MORE THAN 60 OF THE LARGEST FOOD COMPANIES HAVE REJECTED GESTATION CRATES AND DEMANDED MORE HUMANE ALTERNATIVES IN THEIR PORK SUPPLY CHAINS. THERE WERE MANY CONCRETE SUCCESSES IN THE HSUS CAMPAIGN TO END GESTATION CRATE USE,

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INCLUDING AN ANNOUNCEMENT IN CANADA ABOUT A PHASE-OUT OF GESTATION

CRATES THERE. THE HSUS SECURED MORE THAN A DOZEN COMMITMENTS FROM MAJOR

COMPANIES, INCLUDING PAPA JOHN'S, QUIZNOS, BOB EVANS, IHOP, APPLEBEE'S,

MARRIOTT, MARRIOTT, AHOLD (OWNER OF GIANT AND STOP & SHOP), AND

JOHNSONVILLE SAUSAGE, TO PHASE OUT CRATES. IN ADDITION, SAFEWAY

ANNOUNCED THAT ITS ENTIRE EASTERN DIVISION IS NOW 100% GESTATION

CRATE-FREE.

THE SECTION SUCCESSFULLY OPPOSED ELEVEN "AG-GAG BILLS" DESIGNED TO

SQUELCH WHISTLEBLOWING CONCERNING FACTORY FARMING IN A NUMBER OF STATES

AND SUPPORTED PASSAGE OF RHODE ISLAND'S PROHIBITION OF GESTATION CRATE

CONFINEMENT OF PIGS.

THE SECTION ALSO WORKED IN SUPPORT OF MEATLESS MONDAY, HELPING SCHOOL

DISTRICTS FROM COAST TO COAST, INCLUDING SOME OF THE NATION'S LARGEST,

ADOPT "MEATLESS MONDAY" PROGRAMS. THE LOS ANGELES UNIFIED SCHOOL

DISTRICT ALONE SWITCHED AN ESTIMATED 34 MILLION MEALS EACH YEAR. THE

SECTION ALSO HELPED DOZENS OF ORGANIZATIONS INTERNATIONALLY PROMOTE

MEATLESS MONDAY MENUS. OVERALL, THE HSUS GARNERED NEARLY 100

INSTITUTIONAL-LEVEL MEATLESS MONDAY POLICIES IN 2013.

RURAL OUTREACH AND AFFAIRS

THROUGHOUT 2013, THE HSUS STRENGTHENED ITS COLLABORATION WITH FARMERS

COMMITTED TO HUMANE AND SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE AND THE STRONGEST

STANDARDS OF ANIMAL CARE. THE HSUS WORKED WITH RANK-AND-FILE FARMERS

TO CREATE AGRICULTURAL COUNCILS IN OHIO AND IOWA, WHILE MAINTAINING

THOSE ESTABLISHED IN COLORADO AND NEBRASKA. THE SECTION WORKED TO

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AMPLIFY THE VOICES OF FARMERS WHO REJECT INHUMANE CONFINEMENT PRACTICES

AND WANT TO PRESERVE FAMILY FARMS, AND PARTNERED WITH FARMERS ON

LAWSUITS TO CHALLENGE THE MISUSE OF FUNDS IN THE BEEF AND PORK

CHECK-OFF PROGRAMS FOR LOBBYING ACTIVITIES THAT UNDERMINE THE FAMILY

FARM IN AMERICA. RURAL OUTREACH AND AFFAIRS ALSO HOSTED A WORKSHOP TO

HELP NEBRASKA FARMERS BECOME CERTIFIED BY ANIMAL WELFARE PROGRAMS, AND

IN NEBRASKA AND COLORADO, HOSTED FARM TOURS EDUCATING PEOPLE ON HIGHER

ANIMAL WELFARE PRACTICES AND FAMILY FARMS.

PUPPY MILLS CAMPAIGN

THE PUPPY MILLS CAMPAIGN EDUCATES THE PUBLIC ABOUT HOW TO OBTAIN DOGS

AS PETS WITHOUT SUPPORTING THE PUPPY MILL INDUSTRY, WHILE SEEKING TO

HIGHLIGHT THE PROBLEMS ASSOCIATED WITH HIGH-VOLUME, SUBSTANDARD

COMMERCIAL DOG BREEDING OPERATIONS. THE SECTION SUPPORTS RESPONSIBLE

DOG BREEDERS BY GIVING INFORMATION TO THE PUBLIC ON HOW TO SELECT A

RESPONSIBLE BREEDER, AND BY WORKING WITH A BREEDERS' ADVISORY AND

RESOURCE COUNCIL (BARC). THE CAMPAIGN CELEBRATED ITS 2013 PUPPY MILL

ACTION WEEK NATIONWIDE DURING THE WEEK OF MOTHER'S DAY, BY RELEASING A

HORRIBLE HUNDRED, A REPORT DOCUMENTING SPECIFIC PROBLEMS AT 100 PUPPY

MILLS ACROSS THE COUNTRY. THE REPORT GENERATED MORE THAN 50 MEDIA

ARTICLES, AND MANY OF THE BREEDERS LISTED IN THE REPORT HAVE NOW BEEN

SHUT DOWN. IN ADDITION, THE CAMPAIGN SUPPORTED 15 SUCCESSFUL BILLS

CRACKING DOWN ON PUPPY MILLS IN 2013, INCLUDING LEGISLATION IN NEW YORK

THAT WILL ALLOW MUNICIPALITIES TO PASS ORDINANCES WITH STRONGER

STANDARDS OF CARE, A BILL IN ILLINOIS THAT STRENGTHENS PROTECTIONS FOR

PEOPLE WHO BUY SICK PUPPIES, AND A BILL IN WV THAT REQUIRES LARGE-SCALE

DOG BREEDERS TO BE LICENSED AND INSPECTED.

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THE PUPPY MILLS CAMPAIGN ALSO HELPS TO RESEARCH AND INVESTIGATE PROBLEM PUPPY MILLS, OFTEN LEADING TO PUPPY MILL CLOSURES AND RESCUES. IN 2013, OUR RESCUE TEAM REMOVED 724 PUPPY MILL DOGS FROM PUPPY MILLS IN SEVERAL STATES; SINCE 2006, THE HSUS HAS HELPED AUTHORITIES TO RESCUE MORE THAN 11,000 DOGS FROM LIVES OF MISERY IN PUPPY MILLS. THE HSUS ALSO CONDUCTED UNDERCOVER INVESTIGATIONS SHOWING PUPPY MILL DOGS BEING SOLD AT FLEA MARKETS AND PET STORES.

IN MAY, THE TODAY SHOW PICKED UP THE HSUS'S EXPOSE ON THE AMERICAN KENNEL CLUB'S TOLERANCE OF PUPPY MILLS AND ITS HISTORY OF LOBBYING AGAINST LAWS THAT WOULD REGULATE THEM. IN SEPTEMBER, THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE FINALIZED AN HSUS-BACKED RULE THAT COULD BRING AS MANY AS 2,000 INTERNET DOG SELLERS UNDER FEDERAL REGULATION. IN ADDITION, THE CAMPAIGN ASSISTED IN CONVERTING THREE PET STORES THAT HAD PREVIOUSLY SOLD PUPPIES TO A HUMANE MODEL THAT OFFERS DOGS AND PUPPIES FROM LOCAL SHELTERS INSTEAD, AND ASSISTED IN PASSING DOZENS OF ORDINANCES THAT PREVENT PUPPIES FROM BEING SOLD IN PET STORES.

FEDERAL AFFAIRS

THE HSUS FEDERAL AFFAIRS SECTION FOCUSES ON SUPPORT AND PASSAGE OF ANIMAL PROTECTION LEGISLATION AND REGULATORY MEASURES AT THE FEDERAL LEVEL. IN 2013, THE SECTION PLAYED A CRUCIAL ROLE IN SECURING THE PASSAGE OF A BILL IN CONGRESS TO CONTINUE FUNDING FOR CHIMPANZEE SANCTUARIES (PREEMIE REAUTHORIZATION ACT, S. 252 TITLE III); IN PERSUADING THE U.S. FISH AND WILDLIFE SERVICE TO PROPOSE LISTING ALL CHIMPANZEES AS ENDANGERED, WHETHER THEY LIVE IN THE WILD OR IN

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CAPTIVITY; AND IN GETTING THE NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH TO COMMIT

TO RETIRING NEARLY 90 PERCENT OF THE CHIMPANZEES OWNED BY THE

GOVERNMENT TO SANCTUARY. THE SECTION ALSO HELPED TO SECURE LANGUAGE IN

THE HOUSE AND SENATE FARM BILLS TO MAKE IT A FEDERAL CRIME TO ATTEND OR

BRING A CHILD TO AN ANIMAL FIGHT. THE SECTION HELPED TO LAY

SUBSTANTIAL GROUNDWORK ON A NUMBER OF OTHER ISSUES—SUCH AS PROTECTING

HORSES FROM "SORING" CRUELTY, DOPING, AND SLAUGHTER, AND FORTIFYING THE

FEDERAL LAW AGAINST DOGFIGHTING AND COCKFIGHTING.

THE SECTION ALSO SUPPORTED ATTEMPTS TO INCLUDE REPORT LANGUAGE FOR FEDERAL BUDGET APPROPRIATIONS TO PROVIDE FUNDING FOR ALTERNATIVES DEVELOPMENT IN RESEARCH, TESTING, AND EDUCATION TO BENEFIT ANIMALS; SUPPORTED A CONGRESSIONAL CALL FOR AN AUDIT OF USDA WILDLIFE SERVICES; AND SUPPORTED A CONGRESSIONAL CALL FOR THE INCLUSION OF FIVE SPECIES OF DANGEROUS CONSTRICTOR SNAKES TO THE LIST OF INJURIOUS SPECIES WHOSE TRADE IS BANNED UNDER THE LACEY ACT.

THE SECTION ALSO WORKED TO OPPOSE HARMFUL INITIATIVES CONCERNING WILDLIFE, INCLUDING THE "SPORTSMEN'S" ACTS (H.R. 3590/S. 1335), WHICH INCLUDED ADVERSE PROVISIONS CONCERNING EXPANDED HUNTING ON ALL FEDERAL PUBLIC LANDS, POLAR BEAR TROPHY EXPORTS, AND TOXIC LEAD AMMUNITION, AND THE KING AMENDMENT TO THE FARM BILL, WHICH POSED A SERIOUS THREAT TO STATE AND LOCAL LAWS CONCERNED WITH THE PROTECTION OF ANIMALS, FOOD SAFETY, AND OTHER AGRICULTURAL ISSUES.

EXPLANATION: INVESTIGATIONS

CONSISTENT WITH ITS FOUNDERS' VISION, THE HSUS CONDUCTS UNDERCOVER INVESTIGATIONS INTO ANIMAL CRUELTY. IN 2013, THE HSUS INVESTIGATED TEXAS PET STORES AND THE ORIGINS OF THE PUPPIES THEY SELL, USING THE EVIDENCE TO POINT OUT THE HUGE DISPARITY IN WHAT CONSUMERS ARE TOLD BY PET STORES, AND THE TRUTH, WHICH IS THAT THE MAJORITY OF PUPPIES IN TEXAS PET STORES ARE FROM PUPPY MILLS. AN HSUS INVESTIGATOR WENT BEHIND THE SCENES AT GEORGIA REGENTS UNIVERSITY TO EXPOSE PAINFUL DENTAL EXPERIMENTS ON HOUND DOGS OBTAINED FROM A CLASS B DEALER WITH A HISTORY OF VIOLATING THE FEDERAL ANIMAL WELFARE ACT. AN HSUS

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INVESTIGATOR ALSO LOOKED INTO TEXAS BIOMEDICAL RESEARCH INSTITUTE'S
TREATMENT OF PRIMATES AT ITS FEDERALLY-FUNDED FACILITY IN SAN ANTONIO.
A SUBSEQUENT COMPLAINT TO THE USDA RESULTED IN AN INVESTIGATION BY THE
FEDERAL AGENCY AND A FORMAL COMPLAINT AGAINST TBRI FOR HAVING FAILED TO
GIVE ADEQUATE VETERINARY CARE TO INJURED AND SICK PRIMATES. THE HSUS
ALSO CARRIED OUT INVESTIGATIONS INTO FOX PENNING IN VIRGINIA AND
SEVERAL PUPPY MILLS.

THE HSUS USES ONLINE MEDIA TO REACH ITS SUPPORTERS AND MEMBERS, AND
SENDS THOUSANDS OF EMAIL COMMUNICATIONS TO ITS CONSTITUENTS APPRISING
THEM OF PROGRESS IN ITS WORK.

NATIONAL VOLUNTEER CENTER

THE HSUS VOLUNTEER OUTREACH DEPARTMENT STANDS AT THE HEART OF THE
HSUS'S EFFORTS TO PROMOTE ANIMAL WELFARE VOLUNTEERISM IN GENERAL AND
OPPORTUNITIES FOR ENGAGEMENT WITH THE HSUS AND ITS AFFILIATES IN
PARTICULAR, VIA EMERGENCY RESPONSE DEPLOYMENT, ANIMAL CARE, COMMUNITY
OUTREACH, MEDIA AND COMMUNICATIONS, INTERNSHIPS, AND CITIZEN ADVOCACY.
THE PROGRAM PROVIDES SUPPORTERS WITH SUGGESTIONS FOR VOLUNTEERISM AND
HELPS LINK THEM TO SPECIFIC CHANNELS WHERE VOLUNTEER SERVICE IS NEEDED.

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VOLUNTEER OUTREACH BUILT AND MANAGES A VOLUNTEER MANAGEMENT AND GRASSROOTS DATABASE TO CAPTURE SUPPORTERS' INTERESTS AND ACTIVITIES, AND ENGAGE THEM FURTHER IN OUR WORK. IN 2013, THE DEPARTMENT SUPPORTED THE INVOLVEMENT OF 2047 VOLUNTEERS WHO PERFORMED OVER 137,000 HOURS OF SERVICE, PLUS AN ADDITIONAL 156 INTERNS WHO WORKED NEARLY 48,000 HOURS ON BEHALF OF THE HSUS AND ITS AFFILIATES. THE PROGRAM HAS BOLSTERED OR DEVELOPED THE ENGAGEMENT OF VOLUNTEERS AND INTERNS IN NEARLY 80 DIFFERENT DEPARTMENTS AND PROGRAMS ACROSS THE ORGANIZATION AND PROVIDES VOLUNTEER MANAGEMENT TRAINING AND RESOURCES TO MANAGERS OF VOLUNTEERS ACROSS THE ANIMAL PROTECTION FIELD.

COMPANION ANIMALS

THE HSUS IS COMMITTED TO CREATING A SAFER, KINDER WORLD FOR CATS, DOGS AND OTHER ANIMAL COMPANIONS. THE COMPANION ANIMALS SECTION CONDUCTS A NUMBER OF PROGRAMS AIMED AT REDUCING EUTHANASIA OF HEALTHY AND TREATABLE ANIMALS, PROMOTES THE DEVELOPMENT OF LOVING, REWARDING, AND LASTING COMPANION ANIMAL-HUMAN BONDS, AND WORKS WITH SHELTERS AND RESCUE GROUPS TO PREVENT ANIMAL SUFFERING WHEN THAT BOND BREAKS. THE SECTION INTERACTS WITH THE PUBLIC ON ISSUES INCLUDING SPAYING AND NEUTERING, TETHERING OF DOGS, GREYHOUND RACING, MICRO-CHIPPING, AND THE MANAGEMENT OF FERAL CATS, AND WORKS TO PROVIDE COMMUNITIES, SHELTERS,

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AND PET OWNERS WITH THE KNOWLEDGE AND SKILLS THEY NEED TO ELIMINATE ANIMAL CRUELTY, END PET OVERPOPULATION, AND PROVIDE SAFE, HAPPY HOMES FOR COMPANION ANIMALS.

IN 2013, OUR GROUNDBREAKING PETS FOR LIFE PROGRAM BROUGHT VITAL PET CARE SERVICES TO 12,000 PETS, PROVIDING 8,773 SPAY/NEUTER SURGERIES IN UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES IN CHICAGO, PHILADELPHIA, ATLANTA, AND LOS ANGELES. THE PETS FOR LIFE TRAINING AND MENTORSHIP PROGRAM, FUNDED BY PETSMAST CHARITIES, PROVIDED MENTORSHIP TO ANIMAL SHELTERS AND RESCUE GROUPS IN 10 NEW CITIES. THE FIRST-YEAR GRANTS MADE IT POSSIBLE TO PROVIDE SERVICE TO MORE THAN 9,500 PETS AND TO PERFORM 4,200 SPAY/NEUTER SURGERIES. THE HSUS HAS NOW HELPED WITH IMPLEMENTATION OF PETS FOR LIFE-STYLE PROGRAMS IN 22 COMMUNITIES NATIONWIDE.

THE SHELTER PET PROJECT, A COLLABORATION OF THE HSUS, THE AD COUNCIL, AND MADDIE'S FUND, SPONSORS GAME-CHANGING TV, PRINT, RADIO, ONLINE, AND OUTDOOR ADS TO PROMOTE ADOPTION OF SHELTER PETS NATIONWIDE AND TO REDUCE THE EUTHANASIA OF HEALTHY ANIMALS. IN 2013, SHELTER PET PROJECT PSA'S RAN MORE THAN 811,000 TIMES IN PRINT, RADIO, TELEVISION, AND OUT OF HOME ADVERTISING. THE TOTAL DONATED REVENUE WAS \$38,343,149. SINCE THE CAMPAIGN'S LAUNCH IN 2009, THE PSAS HAVE RUN OVER 3 MILLION TIMES (\$176.8 MILLION IN FREE ADVERTISING), AND THE CAMPAIGN IS EXPECTED TO GENERATE AN ADDITIONAL \$40 MILLION IN FUTURE ADVERTISING IN 2014. SINCE ITS INCEPTION IN 2009, THE SHELTER PET PROJECT HAS WORKED TO LIFT PUBLIC PERCEPTION OF ANIMAL SHELTERS AND SHELTER PETS AND HAS BEEN PART OF DRIVING DOWN THE NUMBER OF PETS WHO LOSE THEIR LIVES IN SHELTERS BY 12 PERCENT. 3 TO 4 MILLION SHELTER PETS GET ADOPTED EACH YEAR, WHICH MEANS JUST 29 PERCENT OF DOGS AND 33 PERCENT OF CATS IN AMERICAN HOMES

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WERE ADOPTED FROM SHELTERS OR RESCUE GROUPS. 2.7 MILLION HEALTHY OR TREATABLE PETS STILL NEED OUR HELP TO FIND A HOME EACH YEAR. IN 2013, THE SHELTER PET PROJECT CAMPAIGN RANKED 15TH IN DONATED MEDIA OF CURRENT AD COUNCIL CAMPAIGNS. IN 2013, THE CAMPAIGN RECEIVED ADDITIONAL MEDIA AND VIDEO SUPPORT FROM TODAY SHOW'S NATALIE MORALES, LATE SHOW WITH DAVID LETTERMAN BANDLEADER, PAUL SHAFFER AND HIS DAUGHTER, VICTORIA, AND ACTRESS TORREY DEVITTO.

WORLD SPAY DAY 2013, ORGANIZED BY THE HSUS AND HUMANE SOCIETY INTERNATIONAL, TOOK PLACE IN 38 COUNTRIES AND MORE THAN 400 CITIES WORLDWIDE. DURING THIS 19TH ANNUAL WORLD SPAY DAY, NEARLY 60,000 CATS, DOGS AND OTHER COMPANION ANIMALS WERE REPORTED SPAYED OR NEUTERED. THE HSUS RAISED MORE THAN \$127,000 TO BENEFIT PARTICIPATING SHELTERS AND RESCUE GROUPS.

WHILE MUCH OF THE HSUS'S WORK IS TARGETED AT RESOLVING THE UNDERLYING CAUSES OF PET HOMELESSNESS AND SUFFERING, THE ORGANIZATION ALSO SEEKS TO HELP SHELTERS IMPROVE THEIR WORK FOR ANIMALS AND SAVE LIVES OF PETS THAT DO LOSE THEIR HOMES, FOR WHATEVER REASON. THE HSUS'S SHELTER SERVICES TEAM PROVIDED EXPERT ADVICE AND GUIDELINES ON SHELTER OPERATIONS, STANDARDS, AND LEADERSHIP IN THE COURSE OF VISITS TO LOCAL AGENCIES AND A DOZEN REGIONAL TRAININGS IN TEN STATES DURING 2013.

ANIMAL SHELTERING MAGAZINE OFFERS BIMONTHLY, FULL-COLOR, AND BROAD-REACHING IN COVERAGE OF THE LATEST LOCAL, NATIONAL, AND GLOBAL NEWS ABOUT ANIMALS; ANALYSIS OF TRENDS AND DEVELOPMENTS IN THE FIELD OF ANIMAL SHELTERING; INSPIRATION AND ADVICE FROM LEADERS IN THE FIELD; AND THE LATEST TRAINING AND NETWORKING OPPORTUNITIES. THE MAGAZINE IS

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SENT TO THOUSANDS OF CONCERNED INDIVIDUALS, FROM HUMANE SOCIETY DIRECTORS AND CITY ANIMAL CONTROL MANAGERS TO RESCUERS, KENNEL STAFF, FERAL CAT CARETAKERS, VOLUNTEERS, AND PRIVATE INDIVIDUALS, BREED RESCUERS, WILDLIFE REHABBERS, VETERINARIANS, AND MORE. THE HSUS'S ANIMALSHELTERING.ORG REMAINS THE MOST COMPREHENSIVE ONLINE RESOURCE FOR THOSE IN THE ANIMAL WELFARE FIELD, WITH MORE THAN 425,316 VISITS (240,352 UNIQUE VISITORS) IN 2013. THE SITE FEATURES A COMPREHENSIVE RESOURCE LIBRARY FULL OF ARTICLES, GUIDELINES, AND TRAINING ON TOPICS FROM ADOPTION TO ZOO NOTIC DISEASE CONTROL; THE MOST POPULAR JOB SEARCH FOR THE FIELD WITH LISTINGS OF AVAILABLE POSITIONS; A SHARED TRAINING AND EVENTS CALENDAR FOR THE FIELD; ARCHIVE OF BACK ISSUES OF ANIMAL SHELTERING MAGAZINE; AND MUCH MORE.

THE CAT PROTECTION AND POLICY PROGRAM IS DEDICATED TO ELEVATING THE STATUS AND IMPROVING THE WELFARE OF CATS. THROUGH EFFORTS TO ENSURE HUMANE ACQUISITION OF CATS, KEEP CATS IN LOVING HOMES AND HUMANELY MANAGE OUTDOOR CAT POPULATIONS, THE PROGRAM WORKS TO REDUCE THE NUMBER OF UNOWNED CATS AND INCREASE QUALITY OF LIFE FOR AMERICA'S TOP COMPANION.

EQUINE PROTECTION

THE EQUINE PROTECTION PROGRAM EDUCATES THE PUBLIC ABOUT RESPONSIBLE HORSE OWNERSHIP AND CARE; CONFRONTS CRUELTY, NEGLECT AND OTHER FORMS OF MISTREATMENT OF HORSES; VIGOROUSLY OPPOSES HORSE SORING IN THE TENNESSEE WALKING HORSE INDUSTRY; WORKS AGAINST HORSE SLAUGHTER AND THE SHIPMENT OF AMERICAN HORSES TO SLAUGHTER PLANTS ELSEWHERE; AND SUPPORTS

THE PROFESSIONALIZATION OF HORSE RESCUE ACTIVITY IN THE UNITED STATES

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THROUGH A NETWORK OF EQUINE SANCTUARIES AND OTHER MEANS.

IN 2013, THE HSUS'S CAMPAIGN TO HALT THE CRUELTY OF SORING OF TENNESSEE WALKING HORSES GARNERED ENORMOUS ATTENTION, WITH ABC NEWS CONTINUING TO EXPOSE THE ABUSES. TRAINER JACKIE MCCONNELL WAS SENTENCED FOR HIS ABUSES, TRAINER LARRY WHEELON WAS INDICTED (BOTH UNDER TENNESSEE STATE LAW), CONGRESS HELD A HEARING ON SORING, AND THE USDA SET UP MANDATORY MINIMUM PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS ASSOCIATED WITH THE PRACTICE. THE PAST ACT, LEGISLATION TO UPGRADE THE FEDERAL LAW AGAINST SORING, GATHERED SUBSTANTIAL SUPPORT WITH MORE THAN 250 HOUSE MEMBERS SIGNING ON TO THE BILL. THE FORMER LEADER OF THE TENNESSEE WALKING HORSE BREEDERS AND EXHIBITORS ASSOCIATION CAME OUT IN FAVOR, AS DID OTHER PROMINENT LEADERS WITHIN THE INDUSTRY.

HORSE SLAUGHTER: THE HOUSE AND SENATE AGRICULTURE APPROPRIATIONS BILLS INCLUDED IDENTICAL LANGUAGE BARRING THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE FROM FUNDING INSPECTIONS AT HORSE SLAUGHTER PLANTS, LANGUAGE ADDED DURING COMMITTEE MARKUP IN BOTH CHAMBERS. THE HORSE SLAUGHTER DEFUND PROVISION, REQUESTED FOR THE FIRST TIME BY THE AGENCY ITSELF IN THE PRESIDENT'S BUDGET, WOULD REINSTATE A PROHIBITION THAT HAD BEEN IN PLACE FROM 2007 TO 2011. THE SHOCKING DISCOVERY OF HORSE MEAT IN BEEF PRODUCTS IN EUROPE UNDERSCORED THE POTENTIAL THREAT TO AMERICAN HEALTH IF HORSE SLAUGHTER PLANTS OPEN HERE.

ANIMAL RESEARCH ISSUES

THE ANIMAL RESEARCH ISSUES DEPARTMENT WORKS TO MINIMIZE AND EVENTUALLY END HARM TO ANIMALS IN RESEARCH, TESTING, AND EDUCATION THROUGH POLICY

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EFFORTS, WORK WITH SCIENTISTS, AND PUBLIC AND INSTITUTIONAL OUTREACH.

THE PROTECTION AND RETIREMENT OF CHIMPANZEES ONCE USED IN RESEARCH HAS BEEN A MAJOR PRIORITY. IN 2013, FOLLOWING A LONG-STANDING EFFORT BY THE HSUS, THE NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH ANNOUNCED THAT IT WOULD RETIRE NEARLY 90% OF CHIMPANZEES OWNED BY THE GOVERNMENT AND WOULD PLACE SEVERE RESTRICTIONS ON RESEARCH INVOLVING THE REMAINING 10% OF CHIMPANZEES. THE SAME YEAR, THE U.S. FISH AND WILDLIFE SERVICE ANNOUNCED THE AGENCY'S INTENT TO LIST ALL CHIMPANZEES AS ENDANGERED UNDER THE ENDANGERED SPECIES ACT, AN ACTION PROMPTED BY A LEGAL PETITION SUBMITTED TO THE AGENCY BY THE HSUS.

EXPLANATION: THE HSUS WAS INSTRUMENTAL IN SECURING PASSAGE OF AMENDMENTS TO THE CHIMPANZEE HEALTH IMPROVEMENT, MAINTENANCE AND PROTECTION ACT, CRITICAL TO ENSURE CONTINUED FUNDING TO THE NATIONAL CHIMPANZEE SANCTUARY SYSTEM, RUN BY CHIMP HAVEN, FOR CHIMPANZEE POPULATIONS RETIRED THERE AS WELL AS FOR THE RETIREMENT OF ADDITIONAL CHIMPANZEES IN THE FUTURE. THE TRANSFER OF OVER 110 GOVERNMENT-OWNED CHIMPANZEES FROM A LABORATORY IN LOUISIANA TO CHIMP HAVEN WAS MADE POSSIBLE WITH A CONTRIBUTION OF \$500,000 BY THE HSUS AS WELL AS OTHER DONORS. AS PART OF ITS SANCTUARY CAPACITY-BUILDING EFFORTS, THE HSUS CREATED A FUND, IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE GROUP ANIMAL PROTECTION OF NEW MEXICO AND THE NEW MEXICO COMMUNITY FOUNDATION, IN ORDER TO RAISE MONEY FOR THE RETIREMENT OF ADDITIONAL CHIMPANZEES TO SANCTUARY. THE SECTION SPONSORED A CHIMPANZEE ART CONTEST TO RAISE AWARENESS CONCERNING THE INTELLIGENCE AND CREATIVITY OF CHIMPANZEES.

IN THE PRODUCT TESTING ARENA, THE HSUS HELPED TO PERSUADE THE EUROPEAN

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UNION TO IMPLEMENT A BAN ON COSMETICS TESTED ON ANIMALS ANYWHERE IN THE WORLD, HELPED TO PERSUADE INDIA TO BAN ANIMAL TESTING FOR COSMETICS, AND HELPED TO PERSUADE CHINA TO STOP REQUIRING ANIMAL TESTING OF COSMETICS MANUFACTURED THERE. 2013 MARKED INTRODUCTION OF FEDERAL LEGISLATION, THE HUMANE COSMETICS ACT, WHICH WOULD PROHIBIT TESTING OF COSMETICS ON ANIMALS IN THE US AND WOULD PROHIBIT THE SALE OF COSMETICS THAT INVOLVED ANIMAL TESTING, EVEN IF CONDUCTED OUTSIDE OF THE US. A NUMBER OF COMPANIES AND CELEBRITIES LENT SUPPORT THE BILL AND AN OPINION POLL CONDUCTED ON BEHALF OF THE HSUS DEMONSTRATED THAT OVER 70% OF THE PUBLIC SUPPORTS SUCH LEGISLATION.

THE SECTION ALSO REVEALED THE RESULTS OF AN HSUS UNDERCOVER INVESTIGATION OF LABORATORY EXPERIMENTS AT GEORGIA REGENTS UNIVERSITY IN AUGUSTA, GEORGIA, DOGS PROVIDED BY A CLASS B DEALER. THE HSUS HAS BEEN WORKING FOR YEARS TO RID THE LABORATORY ANIMAL SUPPLY CHAIN OF CLASS B DEALERS BECAUSE THEY COLLECT DOGS AND CATS FROM RANDOM SOURCES AND RE-SELL THEM FOR EXPERIMENTATION. THE DOGS IN THE EXPERIMENTS UNDERWENT PAINFUL DENTAL SURGERY.

IN THE TOXICITY TESTING ARENA, THE HSUS LED WORKSHOPS TO ADDRESS SCIENTIFIC GAPS IN THE ARENA OF NON-ANIMAL ALTERNATIVES DEVELOPMENT, PUBLISHED PAPERS IN THE PEER-REVIEWED LITERATURE, AND PARTICIPATED ON COMMITTEES, SUCH AS THE ORGANIZATION FOR ECONOMIC COOPERATION AND DEVELOPMENT, TO DEVELOP INTERNATIONAL GUIDELINES REGARDING APPLICATION OF NON-ANIMAL ALTERNATIVES. THE HSUS CONTINUED TO LEAD THE HUMAN TOXICOLOGY PROJECT CONSORTIUM, WHOSE PARTICIPANTS INCLUDE PROMINENT MULTI-NATIONAL CORPORATIONS, WHICH WORKS TO IDENTIFY SCIENTIFIC OPPORTUNITIES AND SEEKS TO SECURE SIGNIFICANT FUNDING AS WELL AS

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EDUCATE THE PUBLIC ABOUT NON-ANIMAL ALTERNATIVES THROUGH ITS WEBSITE.

THE HSUS COMMUNICATES WITH THE SCIENTIFIC COMMUNITY THROUGH ALTXOX.ORG,

A WEBSITE THAT NOT ONLY PROVIDES SCIENTIFIC AND POLICY UPDATES, BUT

ENCOURAGES INFORMATION EXCHANGE AMONG STAKEHOLDERS.

THE HSUS CONTINUED WORK TO URGE THE REPLACEMENT OF ANIMALS FOR MILITARY

TRAUMA TRAINING, INCLUDING THROUGH THE BEST (BATTLEFIELD EXCELLENCE

THROUGH SUPERIOR TRAINING) PRACTICES ACT, REINTRODUCED IN 2013.

THE HSUS ALSO FURTHER ADVANCED ITS PAIN AND DISTRESS INITIATIVE TO END

ALL PAIN AND DISTRESS IN ANIMALS IN RESEARCH BY THE YEAR 2020,

CHALLENGING UNIVERSITIES CONDUCTING ANIMAL RESEARCH TO ADOPT POLICIES

PROHIBITING SEVERE SUFFERING THROUGH PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT, MEDIA PRESSURE,

AND THE HIGHLIGHTING OF VIOLATIONS OF ANIMAL RESEARCH POLICIES.

WILDLIFE

THE HSUS WILDLIFE PROTECTION SECTION STANDS IN THE VANGUARD OF EFFORTS

TO DEFEND AND ASSIST WILD ANIMALS, WHETHER IT COMES TO BASIC CRUELTY,

THE FATE OF CHARISMATIC MEGAFUNA, WILDLIFE CONFLICT RESOLUTION, URBAN

WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT, HUMANE CONSERVATION AND WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT, LAND

ACQUISITION AND PRESERVATION, EXOTIC PET OWNERSHIP, INVASIVE SPECIES,

AND CLIMATE CHANGE AND ASSOCIATED ANTHROPOGENIC IMPACTS. THE SECTION

PROMOTES HUMANE WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT PRACTICES AND THOSE THAT PRESERVE

BIOLOGICAL DIVERSITY; ADVOCATES FOR THE RESPONSIBLE, HUMANE MANAGEMENT

AND CONSERVATION OF THREATENED, ENDANGERED, AND OTHER SPECIES; PROMOTES

THE PROTECTION AND HUMANE TREATMENT OF ALL WILDLIFE, CAPTIVE AND FREE;

ADVOCATES FOR THE PROTECTION OF QUALITY WILDLIFE HABITAT; AND SEEKS TO

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FOSTER RESPECT AND APPRECIATION FOR WILD ANIMALS AND NATURE.

THE SECTION PROVIDES SCIENTIFIC AND POLICY ANALYSES OF WILDLIFE AND ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT PLANS, AND ON PREDATOR AND OTHER WILDLIFE DAMAGE CONTROL INITIATIVES; FOCUSES ON MISTREATMENT OF WILD ANIMALS IN CAPTIVE SETTINGS, INCLUDING ZOOS, ROADSIDE EXHIBITS, AQUARIA, AUCTIONS, THE EXOTIC MEAT INDUSTRY, CANNED HUNTS, AND OTHER SITUATIONS; CAMPAIGNS AGAINST TRAPPING AND KILLING OF ANIMALS FOR RECREATIONAL AND COMMERCIAL PURPOSES; PROMOTES THE IMPLEMENTATION OF WILDLIFE CONTRACEPTION TECHNIQUES FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF MULTIPLE SPECIES; CARRIES OUT INITIATIVES TO PROTECT WHALES AND OTHER MARINE MAMMALS; DISCOURAGES THE KEEPING OF WILD ANIMALS AS PETS, AND WORKS TOWARD SOLUTIONS FOR THE CHALLENGES OF FREE-ROAMING CAT POPULATIONS. IN ADDITION, THE SECTION SEEKS TO HARMONIZE HUMAN RELATIONSHIPS WITH WILD ANIMALS LIVING IN OR NEAR HUMAN COMMUNITIES, HELPING PEOPLE TO ADDRESS CONFLICTS THROUGH HUMANE, EFFECTIVE APPROACHES. IT ALSO WORKS ON PHEASANT STOCKING, FOX PENNING, DOVE SHOOTING, RATTLESNAKE ROUNDUPS, FISHERIES, TROPHY HUNTING, AND INTERNET HUNTING.

IN 2013, IN CALIFORNIA, THE HSUS AND ITS PARTNERS SECURED THE FIRST STATEWIDE REQUIREMENT FOR THE USE OF NON-LEAD AMMUNITION WHEN SHOOTING WILDLIFE. THE HSUS AND HUMANE SOCIETY INTERNATIONAL, WITH OTHER ORGANIZATIONS, SECURED BANS ON THE TRADE IN SHARK FINS AND SHARK FIN PRODUCTS IN THREE U.S. STATES; A BAN ON FINNING IN INDIA; A REVAMPED ANTI-FINNING LAW IN THE EUROPEAN UNION; AND TANGIBLE GAINS IN CHINA, INCLUDING AN END TO SERVING SHARK FIN SOUP AT GOVERNMENT FUNCTIONS. THE HSUS WORKED TO FEND OFF A PROPOSED RULE WITHIN THE NATIONAL MARINE FISHERIES SERVICE THAT POSES THE THREAT OF PRE-EMPTION OF STATE LAWS

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PROHIBITING SHARK FINS.

IN RESPONSE TO AN HSUS INVESTIGATION, THE FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION ANNOUNCED AN ENFORCEMENT ACTION AGAINST NEIMAN MARCUS AND TWO OTHER RETAILERS FOR MISREPRESENTING ANIMAL FUR TO CONSUMERS BY ADVERTISING IT AS "FAUX FUR" ON THEIR WEB SITES. THE HSUS ALSO BROUGHT PUBLIC ATTENTION TO KOHL'S FOR SELLING REAL RABBIT FUR AS "FAUX," AND TO POPULAR NEW YORK RETAILER, CENTURY 21, FOR ADVERTISING RACCOON DOG FUR AS "FAUX FUR" ON A MARC JACOBS JACKET. AT THE HSUS'S URGING, SEARS HOLDINGS CORPORATION, THE PARENT COMPANY FOR SEARS AND KMART, AGREED TO GO FUR-FREE ON MARKETPLACE AT SEARS.COM, A PROGRAM THAT OPENS THE SEARS PLATFORM TO THIRD PARTY SELLERS. FINALLY, THE HSUS EDUCATED MORE THAN 830 FUTURE FASHION DESIGNERS AT MORE THAN 35 SCHOOLS NATIONWIDE ON THE USE OF FUR IN FASHION AND LAUNCHED A FAUX-FUR DESIGN COMPETITION AT THE PARSONS SCHOOL FOR DESIGN. AT THE URGING OF THE HSUS AND OTHERS, THE NATIONAL OCEANIC AND ATMOSPHERIC ASSOCIATION DENIED THE GEORGIA AQUARIUM'S PROPOSAL TO IMPORT 18 WILD-CAUGHT BELUGAS THE NOAA RULED THAT THE PROPOSAL, BACKED BY SEA WORLD ENTERTAINMENT, AND WOULD HAVE TAKEN ELEVEN OF THE WHALES FOR ITS THEME PARKS, WOULD FURTHER THE DECLINE OF THE WILD BELUGA POPULATION FROM WHICH THE WHALES WERE CAPTURED. THE HSUS ALSO SUCCEEDED IN CONVINCING THE OBAMA ADMINISTRATION TO MAKE PERMANENT REGULATIONS - ISSUED IN RESPONSE TO A PETITION THE HSUS FILED - TO REDUCE SHIP SPEEDS IN THE ATLANTIC CORRIDOR TO PREVENT STRIKES OF RIGHT WHALES.

THE HSUS'S WORK TO REMAKE THE LANDSCAPE FOR CAPTIVE ANIMALS ALSO SAW MAJOR PROGRESS. THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE REVOKED THE LICENSE OF A MISSISSIPPI ROADSIDE ZOO THE HSUS INVESTIGATED. ARKANSAS ENACTED A

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LAW TO BAN THE PRIVATE POSSESSION OF GREAT APES, BABOONS AND MACAQUE MONKEYS, AND LOS ANGELES BECAME THE FIRST MAJOR CITY TO BAN THE USE OF BULLHOOKS AND OTHER IMPLEMENTS DESIGNED TO INFLICT PAIN ON ELEPHANTS.

EXPLANATION: THE HSUS WILDLIFE RESPONSE TEAM PROVIDED HANDS-ON RESCUE/TRANSPORT/REHABILITATION TO MORE THAN 1,600 WILD ANIMALS IN 2013. THIS INCLUDED HUNDREDS OF PRAIRIE DOGS AND MORE THAN 400 GOPHER TORTOISES IN IMPERILED SITUATIONS, AND THE RESCUE AND REHABILITATION OF DOZENS OF TURTLES, DUCKS, SNAKES, OSPREYS, TRUMPETER SWANS AND ORPHANED BABY WILDLIFE. IN ADDITION, HUMANE WILDLIFE SERVICES RESCUED MORE THAN 2,700 ANIMALS ENCOMPASSING THE GAMUT OF URBAN WILDLIFE SPECIES. THE PRAIRIE DOG COALITION RESCUED 48 STRANDED PRAIRIE DOGS WHO WERE FLOODED OUT OF THEIR BURROWS BY THE COLORADO FLOODS IN SEPTEMBER, AND SECURED TWO NON-LETHAL PRAIRIE DOG MANAGEMENT CONTRACTS WITH THE CITY OF BOULDER AND THE COLORADO DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION, SPARING THE LIVES OF CLOSE TO 1,000 ANIMALS. THE HSUS ASSISTED MORE THAN 250 COMMUNITIES NATIONWIDE ON HOW TO COEXIST WITH WILD NEIGHBORS, INCLUDING COYOTES, GEESE, BEAVERS, AND DEER. FINALLY, WE TREATED WHITE-TAILED DEER WITH THE IMMUNO-CONTRACEPTIVE PZP (PORCINE ZONA PELLUCIDA) IN MICHIGAN. THE ORGANIZATION ALSO DARTED AND SUCCESSFULLY TREATED MORE THAN 100 MARES IN COLORADO'S SAND WASH BASIN HERD AS PART OF ITS EFFORTS TO SHOW THE VALUE AND IMPACT OF THE PZP VACCINE FOR CONTRACEPTION OF ANIMALS IN SPECIFIC SITUATIONS WHERE POPULATION MANAGEMENT IS WARRANTED.

THE HSUS'S THREE-YEAR CAMPAIGN, BUILT UPON AN UNDERCOVER INVESTIGATION, PROMPTED SOUTH CAROLINA TO END BEAR "BAYING"- A FORM OF ANIMAL FIGHTING IN WHICH PACKS OF HOUNDS ATTACK A CAPTIVE, TETHERED BEAR FOR

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ENTERTAINMENT. THIS IS THE LAST STATE IN THE NATION THAT PERMITTED
 THESE STAGED SPECTACLES -AND THE BEARS RESCUED FROM THIS CRUELTY WERE
 RETIRED TO SANCTUARY.

FINALLY, THE HSUS HELPED TO LAUNCH TWO REFERENDA IN MICHIGAN TO TRY TO
 BLOCK HUNTING AND TRAPPING OF THE STATE'S SMALL POPULATION OF WOLVES,
 AND ONE IN MAINE TO OUTLAW THE CRUEL PRACTICES OF BAITING, HOUNDING,
 AND TRAPPING OF BEARS.

DIRECT CARE AND SERVICE

AS A CORE CONCERN OF THE HSUS, DIRECT CARE AND SERVICE COMPRISES THE
 WORK OF SUCH SECTIONS AND PROGRAMS AS THE ANIMAL RESCUE TEAM, AND
 HUMANE WILDLIFE SERVICES. A LARGE PORTION OF THE HSUS'S WORK ON DIRECT
 CARE AND SERVICE COMES VIA SUCH AFFILIATED ENTITIES AS THE FUND FOR
 ANIMALS, THE SOUTH FLORIDA WILDLIFE CENTER, HUMANE SOCIETY
 INTERNATIONAL, THE HUMANE SOCIETY WILDLIFE LAND TRUST, AND THE HUMANE
 SOCIETY VETERINARY MEDICAL ASSOCIATION, WHICH, TOGETHER, CARE FOR,
 RESCUE, REHABILITATE AND PROTECT TENS OF THOUSANDS OF ANIMALS YEARLY.

ON THE DIRECT CARE OF ANIMALS IN SANCTUARIES AFFILIATED WITH THE HSUS,

THE HSUS'S ANIMAL RESCUE TEAM DEPLOYS TO ASSIST ANIMALS IN IMMEDIATE OR

IMMINENT DISTRESS, AND WORKS TO END MALICIOUS ACTS OF CRUELTY AND ALL

FORMS OF ANIMAL FIGHTING, AND TO SENSITIZE PUBLIC AND PROFESSIONAL

AUDIENCES ABOUT THE CONNECTION BETWEEN CRUELTY TO ANIMALS AND

INTERPERSONAL VIOLENCE.

IN 2013, THE ANIMAL RESCUE TEAM DEPLOYED 18 TIMES AND RESCUED MORE THAN

2,500 ANIMALS FROM SITUATIONS OF EXTREME CRUELTY. OF THE ANIMALS

RESCUED, 724 WERE FROM PUPPY MILLS, 489 FROM ANIMAL FIGHTING

OPERATIONS, AND 1,567 FROM HOARDING AND NEGLECT. AMONG THE MANY CASES

ART RESPONDED TO WAS ONE INVOLVING 11 EXOTICS INCLUDING ONE TIGER, TWO

COUGARS, TWO LYNX, THREE BOBCATS, TWO SKUNKS, AND ONE SERVAL. IN

AUGUST, THE ANIMAL RESCUE TEAM TOOK PART IN THE SECOND LARGEST

DOGFIGHTING RAID IN U.S. HISTORY INVOLVING 13 LOCATIONS IN FOUR STATES

AND THE SEIZURE OF 367 DOGS. THE EMERGENCY PLACEMENT PROGRAM HAS 269

AGENCIES, OF WHICH 60 WERE ADDED THIS YEAR, AND THE HSUS'S SAFE STALLS

PROGRAM BROUGHT ON NINE NEW PARTNERS TO CREATE A NETWORK OF 20 ADOPTION

AGENCIES DEDICATED TO REHABILITATION AND REHOMING OF EQUINES. THE DOG

FIGHTING RESCUE COALITION HAS 95 PARTNERS AND PLACED 45 DOGS IN 2013.

COMBINED, ALL THREE PROGRAMS PLACED APPROXIMATELY 850 ANIMALS THIS

YEAR.

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THE HSUS FIELDED MORE THAN 4,500 COMPLAINTS OF ILLEGAL ANIMAL CRUELTY AND FIGHTING, PAID 18 REWARDS FOR TIPS THAT RESULTED IN SUCCESSFUL CASES AND ANIMALS RESCUED, AND PROVIDED FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO OVER 30 AGENCIES RESPONDING TO CASES OF ANIMAL CRUELTY AND NEGLECT. THE ANIMAL RESCUE VOLUNTEER PROGRAM DEPLOYED 416 VOLUNTEERS TO FIVE CASES IN 2013.

HUMANE WILDLIFE SERVICES

IN 2013, HUMANE WILDLIFE SERVICES, WHICH PROVIDES WILDLIFE-CONFLICT SOLUTION SERVICES TO HOMEOWNERS, BUSINESSES, AND INDUSTRY IN THE WASHINGTON AREA, RESCUED MORE THAN 1525 URBAN ANIMALS FROM HARM WHILE PROVIDING LONG-LASTING SOLUTIONS TO HUMANE WILDLIFE CONFLICTS. HWS DISPENSED FREE CONFLICT RESOLUTION RESOURCES AND ADVICE TO OVER 1250 CALLERS RESULTING IN 1208 ANIMALS HELPED, AND PROVIDED WILDLIFE-CONFLICT TRAINING SERVICES TO OVER 20 MUNICIPALITIES AND COMMUNITIES.

GRANTS

DIRECT CARE AND SERVICE ALSO INCLUDES THE HSUS'S DIRECT GRANTS TO OTHER ORGANIZATIONS ENGAGED IN PROMOTING ANIMAL WELFARE. THIS INCLUDES NUMEROUS LOCAL SOCIETIES WORKING FOR THE PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO ANIMALS AND PROVIDING CARE TO ANIMALS. IN 2013, GRANTS TO SUCH ENTITIES AMOUNTED TO \$6.5 MILLION DOLLARS.

IN 2013, THE PROGRAM FULFILLED OVER 3,000 ORDERS FOR THESE FAITH-BASED CAMPAIGN MATERIALS. FAITH OUTREACH PROGRAM STAFF HOSTED AND PRESENTED AT NOTABLE EVENTS INCLUDING THE UNITED STATES CONFERENCE OF CATHOLIC BISHOPS ANNUAL CONVENTION. THE NEW YORK TIMES FEATURED THE WORK OF THE FAITH OUTREACH PROGRAM IN AN ARTICLE TITLED, "SCHOLARS EXPLORE CHRISTIAN PERSPECTIVES ON ANIMAL RIGHTS." THE FAITH OUTREACH PROGRAM ALSO PROVIDED SUPPORT FOR BALLOT MEASURES BY SECURING KEY ENDORSEMENTS FROM RELIGIOUS LEADERS INCLUDING FACILITATING ONGOING SUPPORT FROM SEVERAL WELL-KNOWN ISLAMIC LEADERS IN MICHIGAN FOR THE PROTECT WOLVES CAMPAIGN.

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THE FUND FOR ANIMALS EIN #13-6218740 (FFA), SINCE 2005, IS THE ENTITY RESPONSIBLE FOR MOST HSUS ANIMAL CARE FACILITIES INCLUDING, FOR 2013, THE CLEVELAND AMORY BLACK BEAUTY RANCH (TX), THE CAPE WILDLIFE CENTER (MA), THE DUCHESS SANCTUARY (OR), AND THE FUND FOR ANIMALS WILDLIFE CENTER (CA). THESE FACILITIES FOCUS ON REHABILITATION AND RELEASE, AND OTHER HANDS-ON CARE AND RESCUE OF INJURED, ORPHANED, AND ABANDONED ANIMALS, AS WELL AS PROMOTING THE HUMANE TREATMENT OF ALL ANIMALS AND THE PREVENTION OF CRUELTY THROUGH EDUCATION AND ADVOCACY. THE CLEVELAND AMORY BLACK BEAUTY RANCH IN MURCHISON, TEXAS IS A 1,310-ACRE SANCTUARY FOR APPROXIMATELY 1,000 ANIMALS YEAR ROUND, REPRESENTING 42 SPECIES, RESCUED FROM ABUSE OR ABANDONMENT. RESCUED ANIMAL RESIDENTS INCLUDE EXOTIC SPECIES AS WELL AS DOMESTIC, INCLUDING HORSES AND BURROS, CATTLE AND BUFFALO, DEER, PIGS, TORTOISE, TIGERS, CHIMPANZEES, AND OTHER PRIMATE SPECIES. THE CAPE WILDLIFE CENTER IS AN INTEGRAL PART OF THE CAPE COD COMMUNITY, ADVISING PEOPLE ON HUMANE SOLUTIONS TO HUMAN-WILDLIFE CONFLICTS, WHILE SUPPORTING PUBLIC POLICIES THAT BENEFIT WILD ANIMALS AND THEIR HABITATS. THE CENTER'S EXTERNSHIP PROGRAM DRAWS VETERINARY TECHNICIANS, PRE-VETERINARY UNDERGRADUATE MAJORS, AND VETERINARY STUDENTS AND CREDENTIALLED VETERINARIANS FROM ACROSS THE U.S. AND ABROAD. IN 2013, MORE THAN 1,700 ANIMALS RECEIVED CARE AND MORE THAN

THREE DOZEN PROFESSIONAL VISITORS INCLUDING 26 EXTERNS AND VISITING

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VETERINARIANS, STUDIED WILDLIFE REHABILITATION, VETERINARY CARE, AND CONSERVATION MEDICINE AT THE CENTER. PRESENTLY, 15 NON-RELEASABLE OR NON-NATIVE ANIMALS RESCUED FROM THE EXOTIC PET TRADE AND CRUELTY CASES CALL THE CENTER HOME, INCLUDING AN AFRICAN LION, PYGMY HIPPO, AND MOUNTAIN LION, ALL OF WHOM ONCE SUFFERED IN THE HANDS OF PRIVATE OWNERS. IN ADDITION, THE CENTER SERVES AS A SHELTER FOR A COLONY OF 40 FERAL CATS RESCUED FROM NEARBY SAN NICOLAS ISLAND.

DORIS DAY ANIMAL LEAGUE EIN# 95-4117651 (DDAL) THE DORIS DAY ANIMAL LEAGUE, FOUNDED IN 1987 BY THE LEGENDARY ACTRESS AND ANIMAL ADVOCATE, IS A NONPROFIT, NATIONAL, CITIZEN'S LOBBYING ORGANIZATION WORKING FOR THE HUMANE TREATMENT OF ANIMALS. STAFF MEMBERS RESCUE, REHABILITATE, AND RELEASE HARMED OR DISPLACED NATIVE WILDLIFE; TREAT AND PLACE DOMESTIC, EXOTIC AND FARM ANIMALS IN NEED; AND TEACH THE PUBLIC ABOUT LIVING ALONGSIDE OUR WILD NEIGHBORS. IN 2013, SFWC ADMITTED OVER 12,000 ANIMALS SPANNING OVER 255 DIFFERENT SPECIES. THE SFWC DAILY PERFORMS FIELD RESCUES OF INJURED, ORPHANED, AND IMPERILED ANIMALS, COVERING MORE THAN 7,000 MILES A MONTH TO SAVE LIVES.
