Intern Responsibilities	Weeks one and two:

	Become familiar with the center's computer system during first week
	Become familiar with the handling and medication of a variety of species,
	the various areas where the animals are housed, and the administration
	of other treatments such as physical therapy
	May have primary case responsibility for selected cases during second week
	Weeks three and four:
	Focus on rounds with the doctor: go over cases in the hospital, formulate
	plans for further diagnostics and treatment, and carry out various tests
	Work with technicians: perform procedures such as drawing blood;
	perform routine tasks such as assisting with surgical instrument cleaning
	and pack wrapping
	May be asked to perform routine surgeries such as laceration repairs,
	assist with anesthesia for surgeries performed by doctor, perform

Restrictions	<ul> <li>Must be at least 18 years old</li> <li>Must be in the final two years of veterinary school or have graduated from a veterinary program within the last year</li> <li>Rabies vaccine highly recommended; non-vaccinated externs will not be able to work with rabies-vector species</li> <li>Must submit the required paperwork and pass a background check before being assigned</li> <li>Must learn and follow all guidelines and policies of The HSUS and the SFWC, and follow directions given by staff</li> <li>Must wear closed shoes</li> <li>Must work in designated area; no entering other habitats</li> <li>No cologne/perfume</li> <li>The extern must agree to not publish any articles, case reports, procedures, experiences, etc. in connection with the SFWC unless approved by the veterinarians and co-authored by them or another member of the veterinary staff.</li> <li>Should have access to a computer and ability to login into an online volunteer communication site to receive updates</li> </ul>

Internship Time Commitment	Externships are available year-round for a minimum commitment of 3 weeks up to 8 weeks, approximately 48 hours per week.
Internship Scheduling Guidelines	Externs will be assigned to shifts that are 8-10 hours in length and occur between the hours of 7 am and 8 pm. Externs will be expected to work hours assigned by supervisor, including one weekend shift per week.
Tools/Equipment Provided (including Personal Protective Equipment)	Any medical equipment or other equipment necessary for animal care, calculator, computer for occasional use, 2 scrub tops for the duration (to be returned at the end of the externship), gloves, mask, protective goggles or particulate respirator provided as needed
