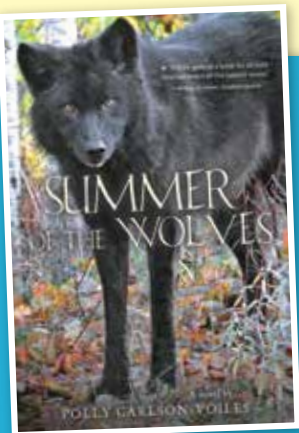

Ask students: How can writing to newspapers about an issue help animals? Is it important to stand up for people and animals who can't speak for themselves? Explain. If there were a Bill of Rights for animals, what would it say?

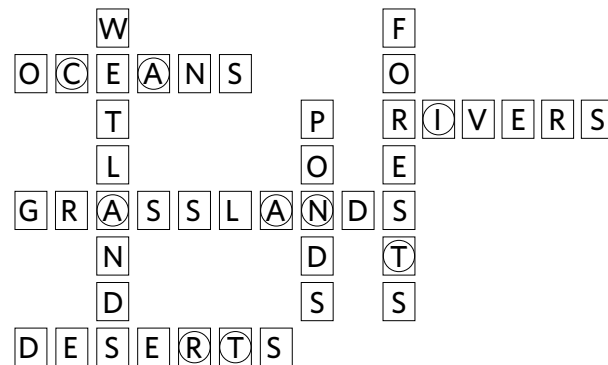
Our mystery critter is an armadillo.

Of the 20 species of armadillo, only the nine-banded armadillo is found in the United States, mainly in the south-central and southeastern parts of the country. 🦔 The official small mammal of Texas, the nine-banded armadillo gives birth to four identical young—all male or all female. During hot weather, armadillos tend to be nocturnal, but will forage by day when the weather turns cooler. They use their strong legs and sharp claws to dig burrows and search for insects. Their long sticky tongues are useful in pulling ants and termites from their tunnels. 🦔 Armadillos have poor eyesight, but their keen sense of smell helps them locate food. Collisions with vehicles are one of the armadillo's biggest threats.
