
Teaching kindness to animals and respect for natural habitats while helping to instill good reading habits in children

KIND TIME

CAN YOU IMAGINE forcing your dog to live his or her entire life in a small wire cage with no friendly human contact, toys or comfort—and little hope of ever becoming part of a family? That is what life is like for a puppy mill breeding dog. The problem of puppy mills is certainly troubling for anyone who cares about animals—especially young children. However, youngsters can come away feeling positive about the subject and empowered to do something about it. This issue of *Kind News* introduces the topic to children, encourages them to take the Puppy Mill Pledge and reminds them that the best place to get a new furry friend is at an animal shelter. Adopting a pet from an animal shelter helps put puppy mills out of business.

THE AUDUBON BIRD COUNT takes place each year from mid-December to early January. People all over North and South America count birds in their area to help the Audubon Society estimate bird populations. How many birds can your children name? Remind them that when they see a bird, they can look closely to try to identify it. What color and shape is it? What is the shape of its beak? What special spots does it have? Young readers who love animals, adventure and suspense will find all three in *Mutt's Promise* by Julie

Salamon. The story follows two puppies, Luna and Chief, whose mother, Mutt, was a stray taken in by a farmer. Luna and Chief begin life as carefree farm dogs, nurtured and trained by Gilbert, the young son of migrant workers on the farm. But when Gilbert's family must move on, the pups are unwittingly sold to a con man who imprisons them in a puppy mill. Desperate to escape and return to their mother, the puppies find help from unlikely sources. The story-line takes many twists before its satisfying conclusion.

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

Our mystery critter is a reindeer. Reindeer are well-suited for life in the cold arctic regions of Europe, Asia and North America. Their thick coats are made up of two layers. The one closest to the body consists of fine, soft, warm hair that's covered with a layer of hollow hairs that prevent heat from escaping and help reindeer stay afloat as they swim. 🦌 Both male and female reindeer have antlers. The antlers fall off and regrow each year. The new antlers are covered with soft fur called velvet. When the velvet dries up, reindeer rub it off against rocks or trees. 🦌 Reindeer have large, broad hooves that act like snowshoes to keep the animal from sinking when walking in snow. Reindeer's wide hooves also help propel the animals through water when they swim. 🦌 Thousands of reindeer may gather together for migration, traveling thousands of miles annually. Traveling in herds protects individuals from predators. Herbivores, reindeer eat grasses, leaves and lichens.
