

Our mystery critter is a mallard duck.

With webbed feet and broad, boat-shaped bodies, mallards propel themselves easily through the water, but their body shape is also responsible for the way they waddle on land. 🦆 Male mallards are called drakes; females are called hens. Drakes have bright-colored plumage—a green head, white neckband, brown breast and black tail. Females are dull in comparison, with shades of brown and tan. Females' coloring, however, allows them to blend in with their surroundings, keeping them safe from predators when nesting. 🦆 Mallards tip forward in the water, tail feathers in the air, and use their webbed feet to steady themselves while searching for food underwater. This is called "dabbling" or "upending."


