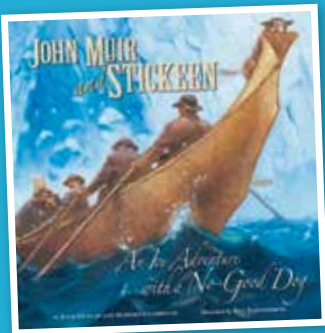


## COMMON CORE-ALIGNED ACTIVITIES

W.3-4.7 Conduct short research projects to build knowledge through investigation of different aspects of a topic. Are you planning a celebration for the 100th day of the school year? To mark that milestone, divide the class into teams and challenge students to think of 100 ways to be kind to animals. Their lists might include items such as license your dog, fill a bird bath with fresh water, take your pet to the vet, buy eggs from cage-free hens, groom your pet, volunteer at an animal shelter, clip your dog's toenails, pick up trash, hang a bat house, never keep wild animals as pets, protect habitats, etc. The list is endless. SL.3-4.1c Pose and respond to specific questions by making comments that contribute to the discussion and elaborate on the remarks of others. 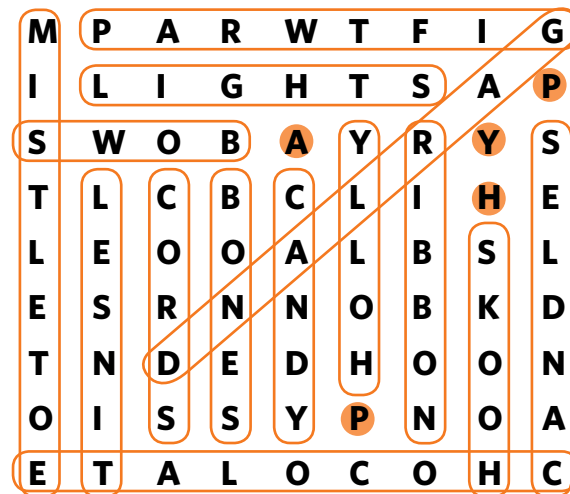

**Our mystery critter is an octopus.** Octopuses have three hearts: one that pumps blood to their entire body along with two that supply blood to their gills. They also have eight arms that they use to catch prey and deliver it to their beaklike mouth. 🐙 Octopuses are found in oceans where they often set up a den in the cracks in rocks or holes they dig on the ocean floor. 🐙 Octopuses have a number of ways to escape predators, including swimming backward and blowing a smoky cloud of ink at the predator. The ink blocks the predator's view, giving the octopus time to escape. 🐙 Octopuses have a complex brain and are considered the most intelligent animals without a backbone.
