Enriched colony cages give each bird twice the space it currently has and provide perches, nesting boxes, and other forms of environmental enrichment that allow hens to express natural behaviors. These standards also would prohibit excessive levels of ammonia in henhouses, ban inhumane methods of euthanasia, and require a national labeling program so consumers have more information on egg cartons about the conditions in which hens are raised.
