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SUPPLY CHAINS. THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, RIVERSIDE, AND LOYOLA

MARYMOUNT UNIVERSITY DECIDED TO USE ONLY CAGE-FREE EGGS IN CAMPUS

DINING FACILITIES. ONE OF THE LARGEST U.S. ARMY BASES, FORT LEE

(VIRGINIA), SWITCHED TO CAGE-FREE EGGS, MARKING THE FIRST TIME THE U.S.

GOVERNMENT HAS PROCURED CAGE-FREE EGGS IN SIGNIFICANT NUMBERS.

THE SECTION OPPOSED A SPATE OF AG-GAG BILLS DESIGNED TO SQUELCH

THE CAMPAIGN CELEBRATED ITS 2012 PUPPY MILL ACTION WEEK NATIONWIDE

DURING THE WEEK OF MOTHER'S DAY, LAUNCHING A NEW PUPPY MILL REWARD

FUND, WHICH PAYS UP TO \$5,000 FOR TIPS THAT LEAD TO THE SUCCESSFUL

PROSECUTION OF THE OPERATOR OF AN ILLEGAL PUPPY MILL. REGULAR

INVESTIGATIONS HIGHLIGHT THE ONGOING PROBLEMS WITH PUPPY MILLS. FOR

EXAMPLE, A JULY 2012 EXPOSED OF THE AMERICAN KENNEL CLUB'S LINKS TO

PUPPY MILLS RECEIVED WIDESPREAD ATTENTION, AND A DECEMBER 2012 EXPOSED

OF CHICAGO AREA PET STORES DEMONSTRATED ONCE AGAIN THAT NEARLY ALL PET

STORES ARE SUPPLIED BY PUPPY MILLS. THE SECTION SUPPORTS THE PASSAGE

OF STRONGER LAWS TO PROTECT DOGS IN PUPPY MILLS, AND IN 2012, SEVEN

STATES ENACTED SUCH LAWS. UNDER THE PUPPY FRIENDLY PET STORES PROGRAM,

MORE THAN 2,000 PET STORES HAD PLEDGED NOT TO SELL PUPPIES AS OF THE

END OF 2012. THE SECTION ALSO HELPS TO RESEARCH AND INVESTIGATE

PROBLEM PUPPY MILLS, OFTEN LEADING TO PUPPY MILL CLOSURES AND RESCUES;

SINCE 2006, THE HSUS HAS HELPED AUTHORITIES TO RESCUE MORE THAN 10,000

DOGS FROM LIVES OF MISERY IN PUPPY MILLS.

FEDERAL AFFAIRS

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THE HSUS FEDERAL AFFAIRS SECTION FOCUSES ON SUPPORT AND PASSAGE OF ANIMAL PROTECTION LEGISLATION AND REGULATORY MEASURES AT THE FEDERAL LEVEL. FEDERAL AFFAIRS WORKED IN SUPPORT OF SUCH BILLS AS THE ANIMAL FIGHTING SPECTATOR PROHIBITION ACT (H.R. 2492/S. 1947), THE EGG PRODUCTS INSPECTION ACT AMENDMENTS (H.R. 3798/S. 3239), THE BATTLEFIELD EXCELLENCE THROUGH SUPERIOR TRAINING PRACTICES ACT (H.R. 1417), THE CAPTIVE PRIMATE SAFETY ACT (S. 1324/H.R. 4306), THE GREAT APE PROTECTION AND COST SAVINGS ACT (H.R. 1513/S.810), THE INTERSTATE HORSERACING IMPROVEMENT ACT (H.R. 1733/S. 886), AND THE PUPPY UNIFORM PROTECTION AND SAFETY ACT (H.R. 835/S. 707).

THE SECTION ALSO WORKED TO OPPOSE HARMFUL INITIATIVES CONCERNING WILDLIFE, INCLUDING THE "SPORTSMEN'S" ACTS (H.R. 4089/S. 3525), WHICH INCLUDED ADVERSE PROVISIONS CONCERNING EXPANDED HUNTING ON ALL FEDERAL PUBLIC LANDS, POLAR BEAR TROPHY EXPORTS, AND TOXIC LEAD AMMUNITION, AND THE KING AMENDMENT TO THE FARM BILL, WHICH POSED AN ENTERPRISE-LEVEL THREAT TO STATE AND LOCAL LAWS CONCERNED WITH THE PROTECTION OF ANIMALS, FOOD SAFETY, AND OTHER AGRICULTURAL ISSUES.

FOR FISCAL YEAR 2012, THE U.S. CONGRESS AGREED TO RECORD-LEVEL BOOSTS IN FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR KEY PROGRAMS INCLUDING A 20 PERCENT INCREASE IN THE USDA BUDGET FOR INSPECTION AND ENFORCEMENT OF THE ANIMAL WELFARE ACT, A NEARLY 40 PERCENT INCREASE IN THE USDA BUDGET FOR INSPECTION AND ENFORCEMENT OF THE HORSE PROTECTION ACT, A 17 PERCENT INCREASE IN THE USDA BUDGET FOR THE WORK OF THE INVESTIGATIVE AND ENFORCEMENT SERVICES DIVISION, WHICH CARRIES OUT SPECIFIC FOLLOW-UP WORK ON CASES UNDER THE JURISDICTION OF THE ANIMAL WELFARE ACT AND THE HORSE PROTECTION ACT.

THE CONGRESS ALSO MAINTAINED ITS SUPPORT FOR THE VETERINARY STUDENT

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LOAN PROGRAM DESIGNED TO EASE THE SHORTAGE OF VETERINARIANS PRACTICING

IN RURAL COMMUNITIES AND IN GOVERNMENT POSITIONS, AND PROVIDED

APPROXIMATELY \$20 MILLION TO ENSURE IMPLEMENTATION OF LABOR AND

ENVIRONMENTAL POSITIONS (INCLUDING FOR WILDLIFE PROTECTION PROGRAMS)

UNDER FREE TRADE AGREEMENTS. FINALLY, THE CONGRESS ALLOCATED \$4

MILLION TO STUDY AND COMBAT WHITE-NOSE BAT SYNDROME.

THE NATIONAL DEFENSE AUTHORIZATION ACT INCLUDED PROVISIONS TO HELP

ANIMALS, REQUIRING A REPORT BY THE SECRETARY CONCERNING A STRATEGY AND

TIMELINE FOR REFINING AND TRANSITIONING FROM THE USE OF LIVE ANIMALS IN

MEDICAL TRAINING, AND A PROGRAM TO FACILITATE THE TRANSFER OF RETIRED

MILITARY WORKING DOGS INTO CHANNELS FOR ADOPTION.

INVESTIGATIONS

CONSISTENT WITH ITS FOUNDERS' VISION, THE HSUS CONDUCTS UNDERCOVER

INVESTIGATIONS INTO ANIMAL CRUELTY. IN 2012, HSUS INVESTIGATORS

EXPOSED ANIMAL SUFFERING AT FOUR FACTORY FARMS AS PART OF EFFORTS TO

PROMOTE REFORM IN THE PIG AND EGG INDUSTRIES. TO SUPPORT EFFORTS TO

DISCOURAGE THE PRIVATE OWNERSHIP OF DANGEROUS EXOTIC ANIMALS HSUS

THE COMPANION ANIMALS SECTION CONDUCTS A NUMBER OF PROGRAMS AIMED AT REDUCING EUTHANASIA OF HEALTHY AND TREATABLE ANIMALS, PROMOTES THE DEVELOPMENT OF LOVING, REWARDING, AND LASTING COMPANION ANIMAL-HUMAN BONDS, AND WORKS WITH SHELTERS AND RESCUE GROUPS TO PREVENT ANIMAL SUFFERING WHEN THAT BOND BREAKS. THE SECTION INTERACTS WITH THE PUBLIC ON ISSUES INCLUDING SPAYING AND NEUTERING, TETHERING OF DOGS, GREYHOUND RACING, MICRO-CHIPPING, AND THE MANAGEMENT OF FERAL CATS, AND WORKS TO PROVIDE COMMUNITIES, SHELTERS, AND PET OWNERS WITH THE KNOWLEDGE AND SKILLS THEY NEED TO ELIMINATE ANIMAL CRUELTY, END PET OVERPOPULATION, AND PROVIDE SAFE, HAPPY HOMES FOR COMPANION ANIMALS.

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EQUINE PROTECTION

THE EQUINE PROTECTION PROGRAM EDUCATES PEOPLE ABOUT RESPONSIBLE HORSE OWNERSHIP AND CARE, CONFRONTS CRUELTY, NEGLECT AND OTHER FORMS OF MISTREATMENT OF HORSES, WORKS AGAINST HORSE SLAUGHTER AND THE SHIPMENT OF AMERICAN HORSES TO SLAUGHTER PLANTS ELSEWHERE, AND SUPPORTS THE PROFESSIONALIZATION OF HORSE RESCUE ACTIVITY IN THE UNITED STATES THROUGH A NETWORK OF EQUINE SANCTUARIES AND OTHER MEANS. IN 2012, A GROUNDBREAKING HSUS UNDERCOVER INVESTIGATION DOCUMENTED SHOCKING ABUSE OF TENNESSEE WALKING HORSES, AND A FEDERAL JUDGE FINED A HORSE TRAINER \$75,000. THE HSUS JOINED LOCAL ADVOCATES TO BLOCK HORSE SLAUGHTER PLANTS FROM OPENING IN MISSOURI AND NEW MEXICO, AND WORKED WITH NEW JERSEY ADVOCATES TO SECURE A STATE LAW BANNING HORSE SLAUGHTER FOR HUMAN CONSUMPTION AND THE TRANSPORT OF HORSEMEAT FOR HUMAN CONSUMPTION. THE HSUS HELPED TO PERSUADE THE TEXAS PARKS AND WILDLIFE DEPARTMENT TO SUSPEND A POLICY ALLOWING BURROS IN BIG BEND RANCH STATE PARK TO BE KILLED, PARTNERED IN A PROJECT TO HUMANELY GATHER AND RE-HOME AN AT-RISK HERD OF WILD DONKEYS (480 ANIMALS TO DATE) IN HAWAII, AND HELPED TO OVERTURN A PLAN TO REINTRODUCE AN INHUMANE HORSE DIVING ACT AT THE ATLANTIC CITY STEEL PIER.

ANIMAL RESEARCH ISSUES

THE ANIMAL RESEARCH ISSUES DEPARTMENT WORKS TO MINIMIZE AND EVENTUALLY END HARM TO ANIMALS IN RESEARCH, TESTING, AND EDUCATION THROUGH POLICY EFFORTS, WORK WITH SCIENTISTS, AND PUBLIC AND INSTITUTIONAL OUTREACH.

IN 2012, THE NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH AGREED TO MOVE MORE THAN 100

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GOVERNMENT-OWNED CHIMPANZEES TO SANCTUARY, AND THE HSUS COMMITTED \$500,000 TO THE CONSTRUCTION OF APPROPRIATE FACILITIES FOR THEIR CARE.

IN THE PRODUCT TESTING ARENA, THE HSUS RECEIVED ASSURANCE FROM THE ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY THAT IT WOULD REDUCE ITS ANIMAL TESTING REQUIREMENTS FOR PESTICIDES, AND SUCCESSFULLY PERSUADED THE U.S. HOUSE AND SENATE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEES TO REQUEST THAT FEDERAL AGENCIES INCREASE THEIR FINANCIAL SUPPORT AS WELL AS THEIR COMMITMENT TO THE DEVELOPMENT OF NON-ANIMAL APPROACHES TO CHEMICAL ASSESSMENT AS WELL AS TO ALTERNATIVES TO CHIMPANZEES FOR HEPATITIS C VACCINE DEVELOPMENT.

AT THE HSUS'S PROMPTING, MINNESOTA PASSED LEGISLATION TO END THE PRACTICE OF "POUND SEIZURE," THE TURNING OVER OF DOGS AND CATS BY ANIMAL SHELTERS TO LABORATORIES.

IN OCTOBER, THE NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH INSTITUTED AN END TO FEDERAL FUNDING OF RESEARCH INVOLVING THE USE OF CATS OBTAINED BY CLASS B DEALERS, DEALERS THAT COLLECT ANIMALS FROM RANDOM SOURCES, SUCH AS SHELTERS, FLEA MARKETS AND FREE-TO-GOOD HOME ADS.

THE HSUS ALSO CONTINUED TO ADVANCE ITS PAIN AND DISTRESS INITIATIVE TO END ALL PAIN AND DISTRESS IN ANIMALS IN RESEARCH BY THE YEAR 2020, BY CHALLENGING UNIVERSITIES CONDUCTING ANIMAL RESEARCH TO ADOPT POLICIES PROHIBITING SEVERE SUFFERING THROUGH PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT, MEDIA PRESSURE, AND THE HIGHLIGHTING OF VIOLATIONS OF ANIMAL RESEARCH POLICIES.

WILDLIFE

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THE HSUS WILDLIFE PROTECTION SECTION STANDS IN THE VANGUARD OF MAJOR AREAS OF CONCERN WITH RESPECT TO WILD ANIMALS: BASIC CRUELTY, THE FATE OF CHARISMATIC MEGAFUNA, CONFLICT RESOLUTION, URBAN WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT, HUMANE CONSERVATION AND WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT, LAND ACQUISITION AND PRESERVATION, INVASIVE SPECIES, AND CLIMATE CHANGE AND ASSOCIATED ANTHROPOGENIC IMPACTS.

THE SECTION PROMOTES HUMANE WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT PRACTICES AND THOSE THAT PRESERVE BIOLOGICAL DIVERSITY; ADVOCATES FOR THE RESPONSIBLE, HUMANE MANAGEMENT AND CONSERVATION OF THREATENED, ENDANGERED, AND OTHER SPECIES; PROMOTES THE PROTECTION AND HUMANE TREATMENT OF ALL WILDLIFE, CAPTIVE AND FREE; ADVOCATES FOR THE PROTECTION OF QUALITY WILDLIFE HABITAT; AND SEEKS TO FOSTER RESPECT AND APPRECIATION FOR WILD ANIMALS AND NATURE.

STAFF MEMBERS PROVIDE SCIENTIFIC AND POLICY ADVICE ON A RANGE OF ISSUES. THE SECTION PRODUCES ANALYSES OF WILDLIFE AND ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT PLANS, AND ON PREDATOR AND OTHER WILDLIFE DAMAGE CONTROL INITIATIVES; FOCUSES ON MISTREATMENT OF WILD ANIMALS IN CAPTIVE SETTINGS, INCLUDING ZOOS, ROADSIDE EXHIBITS, AND AQUARIA, AUCTIONS, THE EXOTIC MEAT INDUSTRY, CANNED HUNTS, AND OTHER SITUATIONS; CAMPAIGNS AGAINST TRAPPING AND KILLING OF ANIMALS FOR RECREATIONAL AND COMMERCIAL PURPOSES; PROMOTES THE IMPLEMENTATION OF WILDLIFE CONTRACEPTION TECHNIQUES FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF MULTIPLE SPECIES; CARRIES OUT INITIATIVES TO PROTECT WHALES AND OTHER MARINE MAMMALS; DISCOURAGES THE KEEPING OF WILD ANIMALS AS PETS, AND WORKS TOWARD SOLUTIONS FOR THE CHALLENGES OF FREE-ROAMING CAT POPULATIONS. THE SECTION SEEKS TO HARMONIZE HUMAN RELATIONSHIPS WITH WILD ANIMALS LIVING IN OR NEAR HUMAN

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COMMUNITIES, HELPING PEOPLE TO ADDRESS CONFLICTS THROUGH HUMANE, EFFECTIVE APPROACHES. THE SECTION ALSO WORKS ON PHEASANT STOCKING, FOX PENNING, DOVE SHOOTING, RATTLESNAKE ROUNDUPS, FISHERIES, TROPHY HUNTING, ZOOS, AND INTERNET HUNTING.

IN 2012, THE SECTION LED THE EFFORT TO ENACT A BAN ON THE USE OF DOGS IN HUNTING BOBCATS AND BEARS IN CALIFORNIA, ONE OF THE BIGGEST BEAR HUNTING STATES IN THE COUNTRY. MEMBERS OF THE SECTION ASSISTED FEDERAL WILDLIFE POLICE WITH OPERATION CYBERWILD, AN INVESTIGATION THAT LED TO TWELVE PEOPLE BEING CHARGED WITH FEDERAL AND STATE CRIMES IN CALIFORNIA AND NEVADA FOR ILLEGAL ONLINE TRAFFICKING OF WILDLIFE AND WILDLIFE PARTS. AT OUR URGING THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR ANNOUNCED A BAN ON THE TRADE OF FOUR INVASIVE SNAKE SPECIES, TO PROTECT ANIMAL WELFARE, PUBLIC SAFETY, AND THE ENVIRONMENT. THE HSUS'S INVESTIGATION INTO GW EXOTICS, THE BIGGEST EXOTIC ANIMAL PARK IN THE UNITED STATES, RESULTED IN NATIONWIDE MEDIA EXPOSURE AND THE FILING OF STATE AND FEDERAL LEGAL COMPLAINTS. THE HSUS SUPPORTED THE PASSAGE OF A LAW IN OHIO TO CRACK DOWN ON THE PRIVATE POSSESSION OF DANGEROUS WILD ANIMALS. IN ITS WORK TO GAIN ACCEPTANCE OF IMMUNOCONTRACEPTION AS A HUMANE WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT TOOL, THE HSUS SUCCESSFULLY PRESSED THE U.S. ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY TO REGISTER THE FIRST CONTRACEPTIVE VACCINE FOR HORSES, FOR USE IN THE MANAGEMENT OF WILD HORSES AND BURROS, AND IMPLEMENTED A SUCCESSFUL WHITE-TAILED DEER MANAGEMENT PROGRAM ON FRIPP ISLAND, SOUTH CAROLINA.

THE NATIONAL MARINE FISHERIES SERVICE LISTED THE INSULAR STOCK OF HAWAII FALSE KILLER WHALES AS ENDANGERED UNDER THE ESA AND ADOPTED THE HSUS'S TAKE REDUCTION PLAN TO REDUCE FISHERY-RELATED MORTALITY OF THIS

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SPECIES.

IN 2012, THE SECTION CONTINUED ITS INVESTMENTS IN HIGH PROFILE CAMPAIGNS, HIGH LEVEL AND GRASSROOTS ACTION IN CANADA, AND AN EXPANDING SEAFOOD BOYCOTT IN THE UNITED STATES AND WESTERN EUROPE TO END THE CANADIAN HARP SEAL SLAUGHTER. ITS SHARK-FREE MARINA INITIATIVE ENCOURAGED SPORT FISHING AND RESORT MARINAS AS "SHARK-FREE" I.E., PROHIBITING ANY SHARK FROM BEING LANDED AT THEIR DOCKS.

THE SECTION FOCUSED ATTENTION AND RESOURCES ON THE BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT'S WILD HORSE MANAGEMENT PROGRAM AND WORKED TO PROMOTE THE USE OF PORCINE ZONA PELLUCIDA (PZP) VACCINE AS A CONTRACEPTIVE AGENT IN HORSES. THE SECTION CAMPAIGNED AGAINST THE WORST PREDATOR CONTROL PRACTICES EMPLOYED OR SANCTIONED BY THE USDA'S WILDLIFE SERVICES DIVISION. IN A FEW LOCATIONS, THE SECTION ENGAGED THE NATIONAL PARK SERVICE ON EQUINE, UNGULATE, PREDATOR, AND EXOTIC SPECIES MANAGEMENT POLICIES AND PROCEDURES, AND IT CONTINUED ITS EFFORTS TO PROTECT HUNDREDS OF SEA LIONS AT BONNEVILLE DAM ON THE COLUMBIA RIVER ALONG THE BORDER OF OREGON AND WASHINGTON.

THE HSUS'S FUR-FREE CAMPAIGN WORKS TO PREVENT THE SUFFERING AND DEATH OF ANIMALS FOR THE FUR TRADE, BY EDUCATING RETAILERS, DESIGNERS, FASHION STUDENTS, AND THE GENERAL PUBLIC, AND ENCOURAGING THEM TO AVOID ANIMAL FUR IN FAVOR OF ALTERNATIVES. THE CAMPAIGN ALSO SEEKS TO PROTECT THE PUBLIC FROM BEING DUPED INTO INADVERTENTLY SUPPORTING THE FUR TRADE, AND MONITORS THE MARKETPLACE FOR FALSELY LABELED ITEMS THAT MIGHT CONTAIN FUR, EFFECTIVELY SERVING AS A WATCHDOG CONCERNING THE FUR INDUSTRY'S COMPLIANCE WITH ADVERTISING AND LABELING REQUIREMENTS UNDER

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THE FUR PRODUCTS LABELING ACT, AS WELL AS THE PROHIBITION ON DOG AND CAT FUR UNDER THE DOG AND CAT PROTECTION ACT.

IN 2012, HSUS EXPERTS WORKED WITH EMMY AWARD-WINNING INVESTIGATIVE REPORTER DAVID GOLDSTEIN OF CBS2 TO UNCOVER REAL FUR BEING SOLD AS FAUX AT MULTIPLE CALIFORNIA RETAILERS. AN HSUS INVESTIGATION ALSO REVEALED ILLEGAL SALE OF DOMESTIC DOG FUR IN NEW YORK, PROMPTING U.S. CUSTOMS OFFICIALS TO PULL THOSE ITEMS. THE CAMPAIGN -- AND OVER 28,000 MEMBERS AND SUPPORTERS -- PROVIDED EXTENSIVE INPUT TO THE FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION URGING THE AGENCY TO NOT ALLOW THE USE OF FAKE NAMES FOR RACCOON DOG FUR.

DENIM RETAILER TRUE RELIGION BRAND JEANS RECOMMITTED TO BEING FUR-FREE AFTER HSUS SUPPORTERS URGED THE COMPANY TO REVERSE ITS DECISION TO SELL ANIMAL FUR, AND GLOBAL ONLINE RETAILER YOOX.COM WENT FUR-FREE IN THE UNITED STATES AFTER THE HSUS FILED A PETITION WITH THE FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION ABOUT ITS SELLING REAL ANIMAL FUR AS FAKE. THE HSUS'S LIST OF FUR-FREE DESIGNERS, BRANDS AND RETAILERS NOW INCLUDES MORE THAN 350 NAMES. AT THE HSUS'S URGING, SAKS FIFTH AVENUE PLEDGED TO STOP ACCEPTING GARMENTS WITH RACCOON DOG FUR FROM CHINA. THE CAMPAIGN FILED MULTIPLE SHAREHOLDER RESOLUTIONS SEEKING PROGRESS FROM RETAILERS ON THE FUR ISSUE.

THE CAMPAIGN FURTHER ESTABLISHED RELATIONSHIPS WITH TWO OF THE TOP FASHION SCHOOLS IN THE UNITED STATES, PARSONS THE NEW SCHOOL OF DESIGN, AND THE FASHION INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY, AND EXPANDED ITS OUTREACH TO SEVERAL ADDITIONAL SCHOOLS, INCLUDING OTIS COLLEGE OF ART & DESIGN, KENT STATE UNIVERSITY, AND LIM COLLEGE. MORE THAN 1,000 STUDENTS

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PARTICIPATED IN PRESENTATIONS AND DISCUSSIONS HOSTED BY CAMPAIGN STAFF.

THE CAMPAIGN ALSO WORKED WITH THE HSUS LOS ANGELES OFFICE TO PRODUCE A

FUR-FREE FASHION SHOW FEATURING FUR-FREE DESIGNERS JOHN BARTLETT,

VICTORIA BARTLETT, MARC BOUWER, KIMBERLY OVITZ AND MARC BOUWER.

DIRECT CARE AND SERVICE

AS A CORE CONCERN OF THE HSUS, DIRECT CARE AND SERVICE COMPRISES THE

WORK OF SUCH SECTIONS AS EMERGENCY SERVICES, AND OUR HUMANE WILDLIFE

SERVICES PROGRAM. A LARGE PORTION OF THE HSUS'S WORK ON DIRECT CARE

AND SERVICE IS ACCOMPLISHED THROUGH SUCH AFFILIATED ENTITIES AS THE

IN 2012, 1877 PEOPLE FROM OVER 30 COUNTRIES ATTENDED ANIMAL CARE EXPO AND 986 PEOPLE ATTENDED TAF.

HUMANE SOCIETY INSTITUTE FOR SCIENCE AND POLICY

THE HUMANE SOCIETY INSTITUTE FOR SCIENCE AND POLICY (HSISP) WORKS TO ADVANCE THE SCIENCE OF ANIMAL WELFARE AND ITS PRINCIPLES INTO PUBLIC POLICY AND OTHER FORUMS. IN DECEMBER 2012, HSISP SPONSORED ITS SECOND CONFERENCE, "THE OUTDOOR CAT: SCIENCE AND POLICY FROM A GLOBAL PERSPECTIVE," ON THE CHALLENGES AND ADVERSE IMPACTS UPON BIRDS AND WILDLIFE ASSOCIATED WITH THE PRESENCE OF FERAL/FREE-ROAMING CATS IN THE NATURAL ENVIRONMENT. YOUTH AND STUDENT OUTREACH

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THE HUMANE SOCIETY OF THE UNITED STATES PROVIDES TEACHING MATERIALS AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT TO SUPPORT TEACHERS AND HUMANE EDUCATORS. IN 2012, THE HSUS REACHED HUNDREDS OF EDUCATORS AT THE ASSOCIATION OF PROFESSIONAL HUMANE EDUCATORS (APHE) CONFERENCE, THE NATIONAL FORUM ON CHARACTER, AND THROUGH THE CERTIFIED HUMANE EDUCATION SPECIALIST PROGRAM. MORE THAN 582,000 STUDENTS FROM KINDERGARTEN TO 6TH GRADE IN 20,800 CLASSROOMS RECEIVE AGE APPROPRIATE MESSAGES ABOUT ANIMALS AND KINDNESS IN KIND NEWS. THROUGH THE ADOPT-A-CLASSROOM PROGRAM, KIND NEWS REMAINED AMERICA'S NUMBER ONE HUMANE EDUCATION RESOURCE. THE HSUS ALSO MANAGED THE SHAW-WORTH AND FLORENCE KAUFELT STUDENT SCHOLARSHIPS, AND THROUGH AWARDS HONORED THE NATIONAL KIND TEACHER AND PROVIDED A HUMANE EDUCATION SERVICE-LEARNING GRANT.

FAITH OUTREACH

THE FAITH OUTREACH PROGRAM ENGAGES PEOPLE AND INSTITUTIONS OF FAITH WITH ANIMAL PROTECTION ISSUES. IN 2012, THE PROGRAM HOSTED DINNERS FOR 75 FAITH LEADERS IN ATLANTA, CHICAGO AND ST. LOUIS. THE PROGRAM ESTABLISHED A 14-MEMBER MULTI-FAITH ADVISORY COUNCIL COMPOSED OF NATIONAL LEADERS. FAITH OUTREACH ENGAGED LEADERS LIKE DR. RICHARD LAND COMMISSION OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION AND DR. ORAN SMITH, PRESIDENT OF THE PALMETTO FAMILY COUNCIL, WHO CO-RELEASED A VIDEO AND COMMERCIAL TO STOP COCKFIGHTING. FAITH OUTREACH RE-LAUNCHED THREE SEASONAL CAMPAIGNS: COMPASSIONATE LIVING FOR LENT, ST. FRANCIS DAY IN A BOX!, AND FILL THE BOWL. OVER 500 RESOURCE KITS WERE DISTRIBUTED THROUGH THESE CAMPAIGNS. PROGRAM STAFF PRESENTED AT PREMIERE FAITH-BASED CONFERENCES AND EVENTS AT SOME OF THE NATION'S LARGEST CHURCHES. IN 2012, 2500 COPIES OF THE PROGRAM'S FILM, EATING

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MERCIFULLY, WERE ORDERED ONLINE AND DISTRIBUTED AT EVENTS. SCREENINGS

WERE HOSTED AT CHRISTIAN COLLEGES AND CHURCHES ACROSS THE U.S. THE

FAITH OUTREACH PROGRAM ALSO TEAMED UP WITH THE ACADEMY AWARD WINNING

COMPANY, AARDMAN ANIMATIONS, TO PRODUCE THE 4-MINUTE ANIMATED FEATURE,

A PIG'S TAIL, LAUNCHED IN CONJUNCTION WITH CSPI'S POPULAR FOOD DAY

CAMPAIGN, AND RECEIVED OVER 10,000 VIEWS IN THE FIRST COUPLE WEEKS.

WORLD MAGAZINE'S FEATURE STORY, "GOD'S CHICKENS," COVERED THE HSUS'S

COLLABORATION WITH THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION.

THE HSUS LOS ANGELES OFFICE, HOLLYWOOD OUTREACH PROGRAM

THE HSUSWLT PROTECTS NATURAL HABITAT IN PERPETUITY AND WORKS TO ENSURE THAT ANIMALS LIVING ON PROTECTED LANDS ARE NOT HUNTED, TRAPPED, OR FISHED, WORKING ON ITS OWN OR IN COLLABORATION WITH OTHER ORGANIZATIONS. THE LAND TRUST HAS CREATED MORE THAN 100 PERMANENT WILDLIFE SANCTUARIES AND BEEN INVOLVED IN THE PROTECTION AND CONSERVATION OF MORE THAN TWO MILLION ACRES OF HABITAT IN NEARLY 40 STATES AND SEVEN COUNTRIES, SANCTUARIES WHERE RECREATIONAL AND COMMERCIAL HUNTING-AND A VARIETY OF PRACTICES THREATENING TO ANIMALS AND THEIR HABITAT-WILL ALWAYS BE PROHIBITED. TRUST STAFF MEMBERS WORK WITH LANDOWNERS COMMITTED TO PROVIDING PERMANENT PROTECTION FOR THEIR PROPERTIES AND THE WILDLIFE WHO CALL IT HOME. SOMETIMES THAT INVOLVES TRANSFERRING THE LAND TO THE TRUST FOR PROTECTION. OTHER TIMES, IT INVOLVES PERMANENT CONSERVATION AGREEMENTS, OR CONSERVATION EASEMENTS, WHICH ESTABLISH RESTRICTIONS ON HOW THE LAND CAN BE USED TO ENSURE IT WILL ALWAYS BE A SAFE HOME FOR WILDLIFE. THE TRUST WORKS IN COLLABORATION WITH OTHER NON-GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS THROUGHOUT THE UNITED STATES AND ABROAD TO PROMOTE ITS VALUES OF THE PROTECTION OF HABITAT AND WILDLIFE. THESE PARTNERSHIP EFFORTS TAKE THE FORM OF ACTIVE CONSULTATION BY TRUST STAFF AS WELL AS LIMITED FINANCIAL PARTICIPATION FOR PROPERTY ACQUISITION, MAINTENANCE, ENHANCEMENT, AND PROTECTION.

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THE FUND FOR ANIMALS EIN #13-6218740 (FFA), SINCE 2005, IS THE ENTITY RESPONSIBLE FOR MOST HSUS ANIMAL CARE FACILITIES INCLUDING, FOR 2012, THE CLEVELAND AMORY BLACK BEAUTY RANCH (TX), THE CAPE WILDLIFE CENTER (MA), THE DUCHESS SANCTUARY (OR), AND THE FUND FOR ANIMALS WILDLIFE CENTER (CA). THESE FACILITIES FOCUS ON REHABILITATION AND RELEASE, AND OTHER HANDS-ON CARE AND RESCUE OF INJURED, ORPHANED, AND ABANDONED ANIMALS, AS WELL AS PROMOTING THE HUMANE TREATMENT OF ALL ANIMALS AND THE PREVENTION OF CRUELTY THROUGH EDUCATION AND ADVOCACY. THE CLEVELAND AMORY BLACK BEAUTY RANCH IS A 1,250-ACRE SANCTUARY FOR APPROXIMATELY 1,100 ANIMALS YEAR ROUND, REPRESENTING 42 SPECIES, RESCUED FROM ABUSE OR ABANDONMENT. RESCUED ANIMAL RESIDENTS INCLUDE EXOTIC SPECIES AS WELL AS DOMESTIC, INCLUDING HORSES AND BURROS, CATTLE AND BUFFALO, DEER, PIGS, TORTOISE, KANGAROO, TIGERS, CHIMPANZEES, AND OTHER PRIMATE SPECIES. THE CAPE WILDLIFE CENTER IS A FIVE ACRE FACILITY AND MODEL REHABILITATION PROGRAM THAT WORKS TO REHABILITATE NATIVE AND TRANSITORY WILDLIFE, PROVIDING MEDICAL AND REHABILITATIVE TREATMENT TO INJURED AND ORPHANED ANIMALS AND RELEASING THEM BACK INTO THE WILD. THE CAPE WILDLIFE CENTER IS AN INTEGRAL PART OF THE CAPE COMMUNITY, ADVISING PEOPLE ON HUMANE SOLUTIONS TO HUMAN-WILDLIFE CONFLICTS, WHILE SUPPORTING PUBLIC POLICIES THAT BENEFIT WILD ANIMALS AND THEIR HABITATS. THE CENTER'S EXTERNSHIP PROGRAM DRAWS VETERINARY TECHNICIAN, PRE-VETERINARY UNDERGRADUATE MAJORS, AND VETERINARY STUDENTS AND GRADUATE VETERINARIANS FROM ACROSS THE U.S. AND ABROAD.

DORIS DAY ANIMAL LEAGUE EIN# 95-4117651 (DDAL) THE DORIS DAY ANIMAL

LEAGUE, FOUNDED IN 1987 BY THE LEGENDARY ACTRESS AND ANIMAL ADVOCATE,

IS A NONPROFIT, NATIONAL, CITIZEN'S LOBBYING ORGANIZATION WORKING FOR

THE HUMANE TREATMENT OF ANIMALS. SINCE ITS INCEPTION, DDAL, A

501(C)(4) ENTITY, HAS BEEN ONE OF THE LEADING ANIMAL PROTECTION

PROGRAMS THAT ENCOURAGE THE CAPTURE AND SUBSEQUENT RELEASE OF WILD
ANIMALS, AS WELL AS SUBSTANTIAL WORK ON WILDLIFE TRADE (VIA CITES AND
OTHER ACTIVITIES), ON EFFORTS TO STOP COMMERCIAL WHALING (VIA THE IWC),
AND ON ATTEMPTS TO IMPROVE WILDLIFE PROTECTION MECHANISMS IN
INTERNATIONAL TRADE NEGOTIATIONS. IN ADDITION, HSI IS ACTIVE IN
CAMPAIGNING AGAINST FUR GARMENTS AND IN PROMOTING WILDLIFE
CONTRACEPTION AS A HUMANE WAY TO MANAGE WILDLIFE POPULATIONS
(PARTICULARLY ELEPHANTS) WITHOUT THE STRESS OF CAPTURE AND
TRANSLOCATION OR CULLING.

HSI ACTIVELY SUPPORTS THE EDUCATION AND DEVELOPMENT OF ANIMAL
PROTECTION ORGANIZATIONS THROUGH A VARIETY OF EDUCATIONAL AND HANDS-ON
PROGRAMS. EVERY YEAR, HSI ORGANIZES AN INTERNATIONAL TRACK AS PART OF

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THE ANIMAL CARE EXPO THAT IS AIMED SPECIFICALLY AT ATTENDEES FROM INTERNATIONAL ANIMAL ORGANIZATIONS. HSI ALSO ORGANIZES AND SUPPORTS WORKSHOPS ACROSS THE WORLD TO ENHANCE THE CAPACITY AND SKILLS OF THE INTERNATIONAL ANIMAL MOVEMENT. AS PART OF THIS APPROACH, HSI HAS BEEN DEVELOPING PROGRAMS AND TECHNOLOGIES THAT PERMIT HIGH VOLUME STERILIZATION OF STREET DOGS. THESE PROJECTS TRAIN VETERINARIANS, VETERINARY TECHNICIANS AND ANIMAL HANDLERS, CHANGE THE WAY COMMUNITIES VIEW STREET ANIMALS, AND INDIRECTLY AND DIRECTLY ENHANCE THE CAPACITY OF LOCAL ORGANIZATIONS WHILE ALSO IMPROVING THE WELLBEING OF STREET ANIMALS. IN ADDITION, HSI ALSO RESPONDS TO CASES OF COMPANION ANIMAL SUFFERING (E.G. RESCUING DOGS FROM PUPPY MILLS IN CANADA) AND TO MAJOR DISASTERS THAT AFFECT ANIMALS BY SENDING SKILLED RESPONDERS AND FUNDING SUPPORT TO AID WHEN DISASTERS OCCUR. IN 2012, HSI CONTINUED TO SUPPORT A PROJECT IN HAITI TO ESTABLISH AN ANIMAL CARE CENTER IN THE COUNTRY.

SOUTH FLORIDA WILDLIFE CENTER EIN# 23-7086391 (SFWC), INCORPORATED IN 1969, HELPS ANIMALS IN SOUTH FLORIDA'S TRI-COUNTY REGION (PALM BEACH, BROWARD, AND MIAMI-DADE). STAFF MEMBERS RESCUE, REHABILITATE, AND RELEASE HARMED OR DISPLACED NATIVE WILDLIFE; TREAT AND PLACE DOMESTIC, EXOTIC AND FARM ANIMALS IN NEED; AND TEACH THE PUBLIC ABOUT LIVING ALONGSIDE OUR WILD NEIGHBORS. IN 2012, SFWC ADMITTED ALMOST 13,000 ANIMALS SPANNING OVER 250 DIFFERENT SPECIES. THE SFWC DAILY PERFORMS FIELD RESCUES OF INJURED AND IMPERILED ANIMALS, COVERING MORE THAN 7,000 MILES A MONTH TO SAVE LIVES.
