BLACK BEAUTY RANCH, our 1,400-acre sanctuary in Texas, welcomed more than 20 animals rescued from a zoo in Puerto Rico that closed. The new lifelong residents include emus, rhesus macaques, coatimundis, llamas, an ostrich and 10 lemurs (including two babies). Experts from the HSUS assisted with the rescue, which is believed to be the largest wildlife transport in modern U.S. history. More than 700 wild animals went to new homes across the country.

ILLINOIS HAS A NEW LAW, supported by the HSUS, that prohibits certain types of testing on dogs and cats.



NEARLY 470 U.S. LOCATIONS now prohibit the sale of puppies in pet stores.

WASHINGTON HAS A NEW LAW the HSUS worked on to tighten up the state's ban on the sale of puppies in pet stores and to ban financing of any puppy sold.

IN MURFREESBORO, NORTH CAROLINA, the HSUS removed 114 dogs from a breeding operation where neglect was suspected. After the dogs were transported to our care and rehabilitation center and examined. treatments began for mange, lice, fleas, heartworm, tick-borne diseases, dental disease and secondary infections.

WE'VE HELPED 3,591 ANIMALS so far this year through wellness, spay/neuter and emergency care provided via our Rural Area Veterinary Services field clinics and community animal care projects.

THE HSUS emerged victorious in our landmark U.S. Supreme Court defense of California's Proposition 12. The decision by the Supreme Court in May upholds the nation's strongest farm animal protection law, which California voters approved in 2018, and unanimously rejects the pork industry's primary constitutional claim. Our Farm Animal Protection and litigation teams worked together throughout a yearlong process to defend Proposition 12, which established minimum space requirements for calves raised for veal, breeding pigs and egg-laying hens, and banned the sale in California of products from animals confined to spaces that fail to meet the requirements.
