Focus of the Internship	To provide a superior educational experience for 2L and 3L law students in the field of Animal Law.
Learning Opportunities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Gain valuable exposure to a wide variety of animal protection cases in state and federal courts throughout the country • Delve heavily into legal research and writing • Have the opportunity to use skills to address real-world issues in litigation before federal and state courts and rulemakings of administrative agencies, including actions to protect companion animals, wildlife, farm animals, animals used in entertainment, and animals used in research • Work with legislative attorneys on drafting and review of federal, state and local legislation to protect animals • Opportunity to work with and assist some of the nation's leading animal and environmental protection lawyers as they prosecute these actions, and find new and creative ways to ensure that all animals receive the legal protections they deserve • Strengthen effective communication and critical thinking skills • Develop organizational and time management skills such as how to prioritize assignments and multi-task • Learn about the organization's major positions, campaigns, programs, and missions
Orientation/Training	Law clerks will have an orientation upon arrival, receive an intern handbook covering HSUS policies, materials regarding Animal Protection Litigation (APL)-specific practices, and on-the-job and professional development training.
Intern Responsibilities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Work closely with the attorneys in the Animal Protection Litigation section • Be integrally involved in the process of researching, preparing, and prosecuting animal protection lawsuits in state and federal court and rulemaking petitions and comments before administrative agencies, as well as preparing and reviewing federal, state and local legislation • Provide research and drafting support for one or more of our eight core legal groups: Farm Animals, Companion Animals, Wildlife, Commodity Promotion Programs, Constitutional & Policy Defense, Animal Crimes, International and Legislative Drafting & Review • Attend bi-weekly departmental reporting and planning meetings if desired

Qualifications/Requirements for Intern Applicants	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Must have a strong interest in animal protection issues, litigation, and legal research Superior oral communication skills, as well as exceptional legal research, writing and critical thinking skills Attention to detail and a commitment to accuracy Able to take initiative and manage multiple projects and priorities while demonstrating a strong work ethic Demonstrate flexibility and an eagerness to learn and take initiative on a variety of projects Proficiency in Microsoft Office suite (Outlook, Word, and Excel) and the Westlaw and Lexis/Nexis legal research databases, and strong familiarity with the Internet and online research tools Able to use discretion, keeping in mind the confidential nature of some aspects of the work Able to maintain professionalism in attitude and appearance Possess problem-solving capability and ability to think creatively, in a solution-oriented way Able to work well independently and use good judgment Knowledge of animal protection, administrative, criminal, or environmental law is preferred
